**ORDER OF BUSINESS**

**OFFICER REPORTS**

**Secretary: Terri-Lynn S.** – My name is Terri-Lynn S., and I am an alcoholic; my home group is the College Park Triangle group in District 10. It is my privilege to serve as your Secretary. I have updated Structures and Guidelines and the Advisory Actions with all motions passed up to the September Assembly. On October 3, I emailed the September 2019 motions to Alex, the Area Webmaster who posted them to the website that day, within ten days of the September Assembly. On November 12<sup>th</sup>, I emailed both the printer and online versions of the September minutes to Alex. He posted the online version to the Area Website the following day. On November 22<sup>nd</sup>, I shipped the September minutes to Carl, the Area Registrar who mails them to the body of the Assembly. Carl emailed the current North Florida Area Conference email address list to Alex who then emailed the minutes to the body on November 26th. The next meeting is scheduled for January 5, 2020, therefore all mailings were completed within 30 day of the next meeting. On November 8-10, I attended the SSAASA, the Southern States Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly in Lake Junaluska a very beautiful place. I loved the focused interactions between all attendees. Specifically, between people from the host Area, Area 62, by my count 13 Area Delegates, our Southeast Regional Trustee, a Class A Trustee, staff from GSO, a Trustee at Large, and many Past Trustees. I attended the following breakout sessions: “12 Concepts for World Service”, “The Pro/Con of “Should we have a linked in page?””, a GSO Presentation, “Southeast Regional Trustee Report”, “Technology Advancements”, “Area Chair: Leadership”, “A.A. Around the Globe”, “Secretary/Registrar Workshop”, SSAASA Business meeting, Past Trustee’s Sharing Session, and the Ask it Basket session. I will be forwarding my detailed report to Vicki for posting in the new “Area News” page on the Area website. Yesterday, I hosted a “Concept 1, 2, and 3 Workshop” for my District, District 10, and I counted approx. 54 people in attendance. Thank you all for coming, I will be sending the PowerPoint to Vicki for posting in the “Area News” section of the Area website. I also presented my portion of the Advisory Actions excel sheet and PowerPoint demo, and I now know without a doubt you cannot run an excel sheet and a PowerPoint from the same laptop. Even though the presentation did not meet our expectations, we received valuable feedback such as: 1) Post the excel sheet and matching PDF with the blue minutes link, 2) Create a video showing the instructions and scenarios and post it alongside the PowerPoint, and 3) Remove the gridlines from the excel spreadsheet. Going forward, I believe that additions to the old “Advisory Actions”, a Word document, will grow exponentially and become extremely cumbersome to use. **Treasurer: Deb B.** – Good Morning, my name is Deb B., I'm an alcoholic. My home group is the Wesconnett Group in Jacksonville and it is my honor and privilege to serve as your Panel 69, Area 14 Treasurer. Will the Host District please pass the baskets? Thank you for your continued generosity. If we can keep the noise to a minimum, I will keep reading. In keeping with our tradition of only accepting contributions from A.A. members and A.A. entities, it is important to include a few things with your check or money order. Your group's name; your group's number; your district number; and your contact information are very helpful. Most of you are doing this - thank you. I even received a Christmas card that contained a contribution, how very creative. We will be voting on the 2020 budget today, those are the lime-green financial sheets on your tables; also, the 2021 budget worksheets have been distributed to the appropriate people; and a lot of awesome finance related material such as the "History of Self Support", Treasurer packets, and some really cool pamphlets were distributed on the flyer table this weekend. I will bring more of the same next quarter, and if there is anything specific or a special quantity you would like from GSO, please reach out to me via email: [treasurer@aanorthflorida.org](mailto:treasurer@aanorthflorida.org). Thank you Linda A. for inviting the Finance Chair and me to District 28 to partake in a valuable and informative workshop called "Ask the Treasurer" and "The Spiritual Side of Self Support." We presented on such topics as, "Why do we have a Finance Chair", "What Happens to Your Dollar After it Goes in the Basket?", and "How Does the Area Treasurer use QuickBooks to Account for the Area funds?" We would love to talk to your Districts as well. This Assembly really rocks it when getting information out to our Area. Now for the financial report, please refer to the white financial papers on your table. On the front page, you can see that we still have over \$11,000 in our checking account (line item 1050). Please turn to the last page. In the center box, you will see that our prudent reserve of \$92,706 is below our maximum prudent reserve. In the parentheses at the bottom left of that box, you can see that this amount is also above our minimum prudent reserve. Therefore, the fiscal state of the NFAC, Inc. is healthy. Finally, please refer to the top section; in the first column you can see that our total expenses (\$78,606) exceeded our total income (\$70, 998) by more than \$7,000. This means that now is a great time to invite your groups to fully participate in their general-service contributions so that we are able to continue to carry the message and provide this level of services to our groups. Again, if the Finance Chair or I can assist you in spreading the message to help increase contributions, please ask. Finally, In November I was fortunate to participate in the Southern States A.A. Service Assembly, otherwise known as SSAASA. If you ever have the opportunity to go to a Service Assembly, I strongly encourage you to attend. I was able to meet up with other Area Treasurers, learn some best practices, and bring these ideas back here to see if we would like to implement any of them. Furthermore, there is nothing like spending a weekend with like-minded people and learning so much more about how the Traditions "protect" and the Concepts "perpetuate" our message, which is the Twelve Steps. One of the most profound things I heard that weekend was, "If you don't have it, you are not asking for it; If you are not seeing it, you are not doing it; and If you are not hearing it, you are not saying it." Thank you to Districts 6 for hosting the Friday night meeting, Districts 15 for hosting Registration, District 10 for hosting the Concepts Workshop, Saturday night speaker and passing the 7<sup>th</sup> tradition basket. District 4 for being our Grapevine room host. Hosting provides a great opportunity for everyone to get involved and I'm happy to report that the host district slots for April are spoken for with the exception of the Friday night meeting. For April we have District 30 on Registration, District 19 as our Saturday host and District 24 in the Grapevine room. Thank you all for your willingness to serve. We received 9 requests for scholarships all of which were awarded based on need. Of this, 4 were shared rooms. The total cost in April is estimated to be \$931.00. ### **SERVICE COORDINATOR REPORTS**

**Accessibilities: Meriem Mc.** – Good morning everyone! My name is Meriem and I am grateful to serve as your Area 14, panel 69 Accessibilities Coordinator. I was so honored to have the privilege of kicking off our workshop with a presentation by our conference’s guest for this weekend, Class A Trustee and General Service Board Chair, Michele G. She shared with us that at a regional forum approximately five years ago, members of the deaf community repeatedly expressed their dissatisfaction with the existing ASL material of Alcoholics Anonymous, calling it outdated and even downright insulting in some instances. Alcoholics Anonymous heard their collective voice and as a result, we now have the Big Book and the 12 & 12 available in modern American Sign Language. They are \$10 each and available right now from GSO.org. A tidbit of information that I found interesting is that American Sign Language requires not only gestures, but also facial expressions, as you were able to see during the viewing of these DVD’s, if you attended the lunch with the Delegate on Saturday. This is pertinent because the showing of faces goes against our traditions. Thus, it is a great example of the complex decisions that the A.A. Service Board is tasked with making and a good example of an instance in which the Tradition needed to be adapted to make A.A. work for this population of alcoholics. It should be noted that the persons in the video are actors and not currently members of our fellowship. Michele also shared with us about a remote community meeting in Alaska, at a health facility that allows access to their video conferencing equipment, that some folks travel half a day to attend. She also touched on our need to accommodate seniors in Alcoholics Anonymous, a concern that is particularly pertinent to us here in Florida. We then had the pleasure of listening to an informative presentation from my alternate Maggie R., who spoke to us about different ways to determine if meetings are fully accessible according to the current ADA standard. She also reminded us that there are four aspects to consider when assessing accessibility, which include the physical, emotional, mental and spiritual accessibility of meetings in Alcoholics Anonymous. Great discussion permeated the workshop and I truly appreciate all who attended and contributed their insights to the conversation. Thank you for allowing me to serve.

**Archives: Beth E.** – Good Morning Area 14! I am Beth G-E., and I am an alcoholic. I also thank you for allowing me to serve and learn as your Archives Service Coordinator. We welcomed 20 members to their workshop yesterday. It wasn’t my workshop, those who attended made it their own. We split into three teams and brainstormed and practiced “Service Coffee Talks” using the Oral History Kit from the General Service Office. Don’t forget to update your Group History Questionnaire. If you have any “in the rooms” photos you can submit them to me and we will display them at upcoming Assemblies. Please mark your calendars for the state Archives Workshop on February 22nd at Redeemer Lutheran in Winter Park. Flyers are on your tables. And our first Tea at the Gatehouse Archives Workshop hosted by District 18 is February 29th at St Stephens in Longwood. Come hear the stories of the ladies who made A.A. possible and some of the first to join our fellowship. On behalf of my awesome alternate, Dan Z, we want to thank everyone who stopped by the Archives Room yesterday.

**Archivist: Vivian F.** - There were 64 hours spent in inventory, digitization and research, between my time and volunteers scanning and reading, this past quarter. A volunteer and I went through the 4 tubs of treasurer records, inventoried and set for scanning. Some special items that were found were information on the Area Assemblies, such as coffee use, attendance and other information that will be useful to Site and Agenda. All of the overage was put into the shredder. In February, any attendees to the Florida State Archives Workshop that wish to visit our Archive Repository will be taken on a special tour, on Friday at 5pm. I will be attending this event and speaking about digitizing our inventory. We have quite a process that has been helpful in keeping up information about members of our fellowship and the service they have provided to Area 14. I want to remind all the groups about completing their annual Group History and sending a copy to us. It will help with your archives in the future if you update on an annual basis. We have had 3 boxes of DVD's donated to the Area. Not all of these will fit to our Collection Policy, so they will be given away. **Cooperation with the Professional Community: Richard S.** - We had 38 active and enthusiastic members participating in today's workshop. We began by surveying which attendees functioned on Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC) or Public Information (PI) committees for their group or District, then asking members to share what ideas and actions they were using for this service. District 7A reported that they had developed "sub-committees" each of whom had specific professional groups to reach out to (e.g. law enforcement, medical etc.). In order to prepare the sub-committee members to take the A.A. message to their assigned professional groups, District 7A utilized role plays to try out various strategies to employ and to develop tools to assess the efficacy of these outreach efforts. Other attendees shared their experiences and/or questions about the CPC process, gaining entry to health fairs for example, including about the best/most effective materials (pamphlets, etc.) to use. The workshop group was urged to contact us at Area 14 CPC to solicit help, including invitations to bring CPC workshops to their Districts. CPC "business cards" were given out for contact information. A report was given by Cheri H., District 19, for her efforts to develop and staff an A.A. information table at the Human Services Summit in Volusia County this past fall. Then Tom S., District 18, gave his report on developing and implementing an A.A. information table for a national addictions professional's convention that had been requested of our area by GSO. This conference had over 1000 paying attendees, more than 150 of whom stopped by the A.A. booth to ask questions, pick up pamphlets, and in several cases fill out GSO's mailing labels to request additional information from A.A. World Services. Tom has also developed a protocol for soliciting A.A. volunteers, and outlining the process to carry out such a mission. Linda G, Alternate CPC Service Coordinator, and I announced our effort to produce a quarterly CPC newsletter, soliciting input from the attendees for such a project. We also gave info about A.A.'s LinkedIn static page, & referenced a national effort to link up CPC Service Coordinators through a Google group site: "CPCNORTHAMERICA." We closed a few minutes late with the Responsibility pledge, finding it difficult to usher out for lunch the many attendees wanting to stay, talk, and request materials. Gratefully submitted.

**Corrections: Clark M.** - We had over 40 in attendance at the Corrections Workshop. A lot of topics were covered. We welcomed new Corrections Coordinators and offered literature and other information that will be helpful to them in their service. I attended the National Corrections Workshop in Houston, November 3rd. I learned of new ideas regarding sponsorship of inmates that are being done in Texas and California. I presented these ideas to the members along with links and contact information. My full report regarding the national workshop can be found on the NFAC website. We heard from Bob C. regarding his efforts to include our literature on JPAY tablets. Correctional facilities are quickly moving to paperless delivery systems and we want to be a part of that. Bob is also still working on the database he created of county and state correctional facilities that identifies the corresponding DCM and contact info. Tim shared a lot of information regarding his corrections work in Volusia County. He shared a lot about Bridging the Gap, which generated a lot of

conversation. We will explore this topic at future assemblies. Mike M. shared his ideas related to the Pink Can, which we will also continue to talk about. Finally, we were blessed to have a former inmate share as to how A.A. got him sober in prison and how grateful he is for the program. He really got us excited about the work we are doing in corrections. We are looking to accomplish a lot in 2020. Thanks for allowing me to serve.

**Grapevine/La Vina: Melanie E.** – Good morning! I am an alcoholic and my name is Melanie. It is an honor and a pleasure to serve as your Area 14 Grapevine Service Coordinator. There were 20 in attendance. The Grapevine Bookstore literature sales were \$236.00, including sales tax. There were \$433.00 worth of raffle tickets sold enabling a give-away of 15 subscriptions to the Grapevine. The total collection of \$669.00. Thank you to everyone for supporting our Grapevine! A HUGE thank you to host District 4 for all their enthusiasm and expertise! After opening with Serenity Prayer, we read the “Grapevine Daily Quote” that came from the book *Happy, Joyous and Free*. Next we all became acquainted by telling of our interest in the Grapevine. We began with some information about the topics for the upcoming issues of the magazine with the following deadline: the July issue will be “A.A.’s 85th Anniversary – A.A. Around the World” (stories due January 15th). The International Convention is upon us! We want to know what A.A. is like in other cities and countries around the globe. How is it different, how is it the same? Do you attend A.A. outside of the US and Canada? Have you helped A.A. get started somewhere? Let’s hear from you! We learned about the origins of Box 1980 in an article “The Grapevine, the FBI and Box 1980” and the beginnings of Victor E. Also where to keep updated with Grapevine news in publications from the General Service Office such as “Box 459”, “About A.A.” (A Newsletter for Professionals), “Sharing from Behind the Walls”, and the “Quarterly Report” from GSO.

Our discussions included “Why should I be a Grapevine or La Vina Representative and what do they do?” Also the “2020 Carry the Message Project”. We discussed ways to promote the Grapevine to our members, groups, districts and area. The Grapevine is supported financially by subscriptions and literature sales so that is crucial to keep the Grapevine in our lives. What is the first thing you look at when your Grapevine issue arrives? Individual experiences were shared like using a Grapevine story as a meeting topic. The monthly Grapevine News was available. Several attendees shared their love of the Grapevine and how their lives are enhanced by the magazine and publications. A past issue of the Grapevine magazine was given to attendees as they left the meeting. We closed with the Responsibility Statement. Another thank you to District 4 and all those who helped in the Grapevine room and with raffle ticket sales this weekend. It could not happen without your service. Thank you for allowing me to be of Service.

**Intergroup: Tia M.** – My name is Tia; I am the Intergroup Service Coordinator. We had 33 attendees. Dean from District 28 presented hotline experiences and strategies. We then broke into 3 groups. All returned to the large group and we discussed ideas that could be utilized by hotlines to get more volunteers. We also reviewed the “Brevard County Phone Army” brochure and talked about ways to reach young people in AA, social media, and texting. I called on the attendees to contact me to present in our workshop at the next Assembly. I also had the opportunity to visit Palm Coast in early December. Ruth requested that I do a brief presentation on Accessibility. I enjoyed doing this as I have been a social worker and District 13 Accessibilities Chair. Thank you for allowing me to be of service.

**Literature: Mary A.** – (Read by the Secretary). With some 40 people in attendance we reviewed the previous assembly’s workshop material. The need to be familiar with “Roberts Rules of Order” and our “Area 14 Structures and Guidelines” was again reinforced. We then took a journey through AA history from 1935 to the present using pamphlets and literature. We saw occasions in our experiences that led to the development of the Traditions and we were introduced to key players in our history that contributed to who we are today. The group was inspired to consider what they would add to the story that AA will write in the new decade. Questions and answers were lively and inspired. One suggestion for consideration was the development of a

second edition *Daily Reflections*. The original book was published in 1990 so perhaps it is time and this could be brought to the delegate in 2021 for that conference. A couple of trivia questions were asked and books awarded. The workshop was light spirited and fun. I look forward to pre-conference items for review in the spring.

**Public Information: Marcela W.** – (Substitute-Darryl S). There were approx. 35 people in attendance. The workshop focused on the importance of anonymity at the public level. We primarily focused on a scenario where we discussed the conversation with the media and looked at how that conversation related to the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> Traditions. We had great discussions about some of the pitfalls of revealing too much information and or leaving it to journalistic liberties around what we say. We broke the scenario into two parts and focused on the specific words that were used for both. People shared their own experience as it related to this type of information. We looked at the affects this type of scenario could create for us as an individual and some the personal consequences as well as how it may or may not reflect on A.A. as a whole. We discussed how important it is when we speak to be clear what we say is our own experience or opinion and not that of A.A. as a whole and that we do not represent A.A. as a whole.

**Treatment: Bryant G.** - Hello everybody my name is Bryant and I am an alcoholic. My home groups are Big Meadow Group and the Hold On Primary Purpose Group in District 30. We had 29 people in attendance including me and my Alternate Service Coordinator. I'd like to thank my Alternate Service Coordinator for stepping in at the 10:00 am Treatment Workshop that I was not able to attend. We had special guests Paul H. and Jody S. from the Northeast Florida Intergroup Treatment Committee who came to the workshop. We had 16 Districts represented. 6 Visitors attended. 2 Treatment Chairs from District 28 and 20. One DCM from District 32 and 16 GSRs and Alternates. I want to put out my thanks for being invited to Daytona to attend a workshop. I also attended a Service Fair at Palm Coast and I will be attending a Service Fair in District 14, Gainesville in February. The workshop began at 1:35 with the Serenity Prayer. We continued updating our facility list. At every workshop someone comes in and asks "What is Bridging the Gap?" which gives us a great opportunity to share information about Bridging the Gap. I also told everyone that we lost our overall Bridging the Gap contact list. I have also started to reassemble that contact list. If there is anyone here that would like to volunteer please sign up on the list. We talked about how "Bridging the Gap" works. Help us create the bridge for Bridging the Gap. We talked about our next workshop and closed with the "Responsibility Pledge". Thank you for allowing me to serve.

### **ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS**

**Finance Committee: Paige B.** – Number in Attendance: 20. Theme: 2020 Budget and Motions for Consideration. My name is Paige, I am an alcoholic. My home group is the Keep In Step Group of Alcoholics Anonymous in District 28. It is an honor and a privilege to serve as the Area 14 Finance Chair. Many thanks to Deb B. Area 14 Treasurer, Terri C., Area 14 Alternate Finance Chair, Bob E, our note taker and the DCMs and Alternate DCMs that serve the body as your Finance Committee. The Finance Committee Meeting was called to order at 2:45pm and opened with the Serenity Prayer. With nine voting members present, substantial unanimity was established at six. Deb B., Area 14 Treasurer, delivered a "State of the Area " report. The current financial status of the area was reviewed and discussed. Under Old Business a brief discussion of the Proposed 2020 Budget and motions to amend it, once approved, were reviewed. Under New Business a small group of members were identified to work with the Treasurer and Finance Chair to research and develop a direction for implementing electronic contribution. The need for identification on all group and individual contributions was revisited. The further complication of GSO issuing new group numbers was discussed as well. A plan to launch the development of "Best Practices Guidelines for Finance" was discussed. With no Guidelines in place for the Scholarship Program for the Alternate Chair to operate under, we came up with four and they will come to the body in a motion under new business.

**Site and Agenda: Lori P.** – 8 of 10 voting DCMs were in attendance with a total attendance of 12. Thank you to Evonne H. and Debbie H. for taking notes. We reviewed “Host District Responsibility Documents (with bullet points and detail pages)”. With minor changes the documents received support from the Committee. A finalized document will be prepared and presented for posting to the Area website. Thank you to Maureen T., DCM, District 9 and Evonne H., DCM, District 1, for your collaborative work on these documents. The 2023-2024 bid request letter and packet were reviewed. Changes to the packet were discussed to update the documents to reflect current area needs. Now is the time for everyone to start thinking about their local districts and possible sites for hosting our NFAC assemblies in 2023 and 2024. If you have site ideas in your local geography please send these to me by email at [altchairperson@aanorthflorida.org](mailto:altchairperson@aanorthflorida.org). We look forward to hearing from everyone with your ideas. Who knows, maybe your district will be hosting our area assemblies in 2023/24. If you are interested in learning more about how the bid process works plan on attending the “Site and Agenda Committee” meeting in April. Additional discussion followed on the topic of our current site and accessibility needs. We will continue to be sensitive of special needs of those in our area; and encourage any DCM who has a member attending with special needs to reach out to us so that we may accommodate. Thank you for allowing me to serve.

**Website Committee: Vickie E.** – There was 7 people present at Website Committee 3 of which were committee DCM’s. “The Website Guidelines” were discussed. Under section 4, letter r., it states that we will link to Area 1 Intergroups located geographically within the state of Florida. At this time, we do not link to the Area 1 intergroups since they are not part of Area 14. The why’s of this guideline will be researched in the Advisory Actions and decisions will be made on either to adhere to this guideline or make a change to our present Website Guidelines. #5 of the Website Guidelines states that “The website shall be administered by the Website Administrative Committee as described in the motion passed October 2008 by the NFAC. (The Website Administrative Committee structure, including composition, purpose, and duties are to be followed as laid out in the motion of October 2008). The committee feels this is vague and needs to be looked at further. Note: I did visit the October 2008 minutes after the meeting, and it will take further research into the Advisory Actions to clarify our structure, composition, purpose and duties. Grammatical errors were also noted under guideline #5. Number 6-9 should be labeled a-d. This will be corrected. The password for the protected area of the website is changed in January of each year. Last year, there were complaints of possible breaks in anonymity: the password being delivered in the minutes. We do have some copies returned. This year I will send the password out to the new confidential list that I will soon receive from the Registrar. The “Area News” page was visited. At this time, we have reports from Corrections and their attendance at the National Corrections Workshop, Website and my trip to the NAATW. The Archivist has graciously shared some pictures of the repository. It is my understanding that our officer’s trip and their experiences at SAASA will be forthcoming. This page is similar to the “Delegate’s Corner” and lets everyone know that Area 14 is staying busy. At this time no votes could be taken due to the lack of a quorum. The chair has been made aware of the situation and I look forward to having a quorum in April.

Background: Bob C. stated that requested documentation had been submitted and that they were waiting for an answer to another question. **Motion to lay on the table. Seconded. PASSED with 1 Opposed. Minority opinion: From Deb B: The motion should just die until all of the information has been gathered. Motion to reconsider, seconded: FAILED. The motion remains PASSED**

## **NEW BUSINESS:**

From Finance:

1. Motion to approve the 2020 Proposed Budget as published in the September 2019 minutes. **Motion PASSED. One OPPOSED: Minority Opinion: From Lon, I have a problem with a budget that has a deficit of \$34,000.00. Is there a motion to reconsider? Seeing none. The motion remains PASSED.**
2. Motion to pass the following 8 motions as a housekeeping motion. This means that all 8 **PASS** as one or all 8 **FAIL** as one.
  - a) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to delete line item 6274, SERF-Alternate Delegate Elect Even Year, in the amount of \$1,000.00.
  - b) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to delete line item 6373, Florida State Convention-Chair, in the amount of \$350.00.
  - c) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to decrease line item 7265, National Archives Workshop, by \$1,200.00 from \$1,200.00 to \$0.00.
  - d) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to decrease line item 7750, Literature: Literature by \$300.00 from \$500.00 to \$200.00.
  - e) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to increase line item 7760, Literature: Workshops by \$300.00, from \$200.00 to \$500.00.
  - f) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to decrease line item 8610, Archivist: Preservation by \$500.00, from \$1,500.00 to \$1,000.00.
  - g) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to increase line item 8690, Archivist: Storage, by \$500.00, from \$1,700.00 to \$2,200.00.
  - h) In the approved 2020 Budget, a motion to increase line item 9410, Coffee Service, by \$1,500.00, from \$6,500.00 to \$8,000.00.

Housekeeping motion: **PASSED, One OPPOSED. Minority Opinion: From Chris: I am opposed to this motion because we are spending way too much money on coffee.**

From Growth:

1. Motion to accurately define the boundaries as requested by District 8 and approved by the DCM's of the effected Districts per Structures and Guidelines. **Motion PASSED. None OPPOSED.**

2. Motion that these guidelines be accepted for the Scholarship Program. Alternate Chair will award Scholarships based on the following criteria but will have the latitude to use their discretion when needed:
  - I. Scholarship cutoff date is 40 days in advance of the Assembly.
  - II. Must be willing to share room with another voting member.
  - III. 6 rooms per quarter will be reserved by the Alternate Chair through the Area Treasurer.
  - IV. They need to inform the Alternate Chair within 7 days of the Assembly if they are unable to attend.

**Motion PASSED. Three Opposed. Minority Opinion: District 24:** No Accountability, **District 9, Maureen:** A voting member with spouse cannot get a Scholarship, **District 7 GSR:** We need to change the word within to 'prior to', is that going to be changed? Is there a motion to reconsider? Seeing none. **The motion remains PASSED.**

#### Sense of the Assembly

Is the Area willing to support by a simple majority of those present the following proposals?

1. To support a General Service Information table in the name of Area 14 at the 2020 Florida State Convention
  2. To provide non-financial support to Area 15 when they host the Southern States of Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly in Tampa in Nov 2021.
  3. To provide support for the 65<sup>th</sup> Florida State Convention to be held in Orlando, FL at the Rosen Plaza Hotel.

# How the Conference Operates

Generally speaking, the General Service Conference follows *Robert's Rules of Order*, and proceeds on an informal basis as possible consistent with the rights of all concerned. It is important to remember that the purpose of rules of order is to make it easier for the Conference to conduct its business; rules exist to allow the Conference to do what it needs to do to carry out the will of the Fellowship by reaching an informed group conscience. Over the years the Conference has adopted some exceptions to *Robert's Rules*, which help it to proceed more closely in accord with the spirit of A.A. Tradition.

## Conference Quorum

A Conference quorum — two-thirds of all registered members — is required to conduct Conference business.

## Committee System

To the extent possible, important matters to come before the Conference will be handled via the "Committee system." This assures that a large number of questions can be dealt with during Conference week. Members are encouraged to trust the process. Each Committee has considered carefully the items before it and presents its recommendations to the Conference as a whole for acceptance or rejection. Recommendations of Conference committees are automatically motions that have been made and seconded. Members are asked to refrain from spontaneously amending the work of the Committee; there are no "friendly" amendments under Robert's Rules.

## Substantial Unanimity

All matters of policy (Conference Advisory Actions) require substantial unanimity, that is, a *two-thirds majority*. Any actions, including amendments, that affect an Advisory Action, or motions that might result in such an action, also require a *two-thirds majority*. Because the number of members present in the hall during the week of Conference varies from time to time, the phrase "two-thirds majority" is taken to mean two-thirds vote of the Conference members voting, as long as the total vote constitutes a Conference quorum.

## Minority Opinion

After each vote on a matter of policy, the side which did not prevail will always be given an opportunity to speak to their position. If the motion passes with two-thirds vote, the minority may speak. If the motion receives a majority vote, but fails to pass for lack of a two-thirds vote, the majority may speak.

Remember that saving "minority opinions" for after the vote, when there is no rebuttal, is a time-waster, for it can force the Conference body to reconsider a question that might well have been decided the first time around if it had been thoroughly examined from all sides.

## General Rules of Debate and Voting

(Agreed to at the beginning of each Conference)

- People who wish to speak line up at the microphones and address their comments to the chair.
- Each person may speak for two (2) minutes.
- No one may speak for a second time on a topic until all who wish to have spoken for the first time.
- Full discussion of a recommendation should take place before each vote.
- Everyone is entitled to express his or her opinion. However, if your perspective has already been stated by someone else, it is not necessary to go to the mike and say it again.
- Our experience is that premature actions such as amend-

ing motions early in the discussion or hastily calling the question can divert attention from the subject at hand, confusing and/or delaying Conference business.

- Voting is by show of hands unless the Conference decides otherwise.

## Motions Made During Conference

When making a motion, come to the microphone and address the chair. There are various types of motions we use to help reach an informed group conscience. The specific rules governing each are on the next page.

## Tabling a Motion

Tabling a motion postpones discussion to a later time during the same Conference.

## Motion to Recommit

The motion to recommit returns a motion or proposal to the respective trustees' committee for further consideration. A motion to recommit must be seconded, is debatable and can be amended.

## Calling the Question

Calling the question brings debate to a halt while Conference members decide whether to proceed directly to a vote (the question) or go on with the debate.

## Reconsideration


A motion to reconsider a vote may be made only by a member who voted with the prevailing side, but it can be seconded by anyone. If the majority votes to reconsider, full debate, pro and cons, is resumed.

## Floor Actions

It is possible for a Conference action to come from the floor, but any matter which falls within the scope of a Conference committee ought first go through that Conference committee, so that the topic may receive due consideration. Floor actions may be introduced at any time during the Conference except at the Sharing Sessions. Any floor action regarding a piece of committee business that has not yet been concluded will be considered out of order. When a floor action is to be heard, its maker will be given two (2) minutes to state the rationale behind the action, after which the chair shall ask if there is a motion that the Conference decline to consider the floor action.

## Declining to Consider a Floor Action

A motion to decline to consider a floor action is made without comment.
