SECOND QUARTERLY MINUTES OF THE NORTH FLORIDA AREA OF ALCOHOLIC ANONYMOUS

April 3 - 4, 1982 - Altamonte Springs, FL

AREA COMMITTEE MEETING: Bob S. opened the meeting with the Serenity Prayer and then welcomed Phyllis' return to the fold. Phyllis commented she was delighted to be back feeling so well and especially wished to thank everyone for the many cards, prayers and flowers.

ROLL CALL: Rhoda called the roll. Absent were Scotty R , Handicapped Chairman and District #2, Steve H .

The minutes of the previous assembly were approved as mailed out.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Elise presented the financial report. As of December 31, 1981 our balance was \$1,871.76; group contribution as of March 31 was \$1,471.75 with miscellaneous collections of \$456.77 for a balance of \$3,800.28. Expenses were \$1,485.95 bringing our cumulative balance to \$2,314.33. Prudent Reserve/Saving Account balance is \$4,821.79. Also listed is a quarterly listing of all group contributions. Through March 31, only 55 out of 245 groups have contributed to the North Florida Area. A motion was made, seconded and carried the treasurer's report be approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: See individual reports attached.

Bob reported the next quarterly assembly meeting will be July 31/August 1 in Tallahassee at the Hilton, District #5 hosting. This date was rescheduled due to the Florida State convention which will be held July 22/25.

DELEGATE'S REPORT: Tom expressed his thanks to everyone for their support as delegate. He stated the need for everyone to look for replacements of all offices for the up-coming election in October. Next quarter will be a good time to announce these candidates in advance, enabling everyone to get to know these candidates. Their names can be submitted to Bob or Tom.

Tom reported he and Evelyn, Alternate Delegate, attended the Delegate's Round-up in Atlanta which is good preparation for those going to the New York Conference. One of the things brought out was the lack of interest in the last couple of years in the Southeast Regional conference. This conference will be held in Charleston, W. VA this year.

Tom explained that So. Carolina would not be able to host the convention in 1983 and we have been tentatively asked to host this in August, 1983. Tom spoke to Lou and Buck who feel that if the North Florida Area would advance seed money (approximately \$1,000/1,300), we would be able to confirm the Orlando Twin Towers in August, 1983 for approximately 2,000 people. Otherwise, money would have to be borrowed. The tentative committment is for August 10-13, 1983. A committee needs to be formed to contact the hotel and put up either a promisory note or bond for hotel confirmation for that date and price.

Bob commented that our escrow is about \$5,000 and the monies to be put up for seed money would eventually be returned. Our expense, however, would be relatively minimal - only the loss of our interest. This could be a valid contribution from the North Florida Assembly to the Southeast Regional convocation.

Ted K. made a motion that the North Florida Assembly put up seed money in the amount of \$1,300 to obligate the Twin Towers to host the Southeast Regional Conference in August, 1983. Porter B. seconded the motion.

Question was raised by Bill M. if by by-laws we were allowed to commit money for the next slate of officers not elected yet. Bob stated that since the next officers would have an escrow account in savings and the \$1,300 would be returned and no obligation made, we can do this.

DELEGATE'S REPORT Cont. Elise stated that it is impossible to get a convention going in one year and Tom stated that January would be too late for hotel commitments.

Tom stated he would submit our bid to Joe K. [redacted], Trustee, at the New York Conference the first Sunday of the Conference. At this time the firm hotel commitment, rough sketch of meetings, etc. will be formulated for Joe's approval as well as knowing if any other area bids have been presented.

The question was raised if South FL was involved in hosting this convention. It is solely a North FL effort - but all of the southeast is involved.

The motion was passed to commit \$1,300 seed money and enter our bid to host the Southeast Regional Convention in August, 1983.

Tom stated from a report from Joe K. that finances were in good shape but only 19.6% of the whole of AA are contributing with new groups contributing more per capita. This should be impressed at the group level the need for supporting GSO. Tom explained that the more financial support given to GSO the less you pay for the Big Book and other publications. The purpose somewhere down the line is that we are going to be able to give some of the literature away. The first one that we would like to give away is the Big Book. This year there will be a review with the financial committee, Grapevine committee and the literature committee to see what we can do to resolve this problem of this on-going cost of the Big Book.

"AA Comes of Age" is going to be updated - there will be an addendum to the present book. There will be an archives book published, when approved, for approximately \$20.

Boca Raton is the State Convention July 22/25 and the Regional Forum will be December 3-5 in Nashville.

Tom stated that Vinnie Mc. sent out a letter on the importance of anonymity. It was sent to most newspapers in the country, AA treatment centers, detox and rehabilitation centers and agencies. Tom stated the importance of remembering that fifty percent of our name is anonymous - Alcohol Anonymous. We would support our tradition in every area that we can.

Tom stated he would give a full report in Tallahassee of the New York Conference.

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Del commented hearing someone say they didn't like GSO because GSO hadn't approved the 24 Hour Book and other publications. It was brought out that the Big Book recommends the use of various other forms of literature from churches, etc. However, it was recommended in Box 459 that all AA literature should be kept 'separate' from any other unapproved literature in meeting rooms, etc.

Dorothy, Alt. DCM of Dist. #14 commented that since Howard had resigned and they were hosting the Area Assembly in October, she would be needing help. Bob stated that she had alot of help from many [redacted] advise of Howard. Dorothy stated the hotel will be confir [redacted]

GSO Workshop JCM

It was recommended a work shop for DCM's once or twice a year especially in-coming DCM's who need sharing sessions and pertinent information when holding meetings in their area. Bob suggested we set this up for the next quarterly assembly in Tallahassee and Tom agreed to chair. Tom stated in the Service Manual on Page 38 is the procedure for the DCM's and plenty of information pertaining to this office. Also unless an alternate is elected, there are times when this can create problems when a DCM resigns.

Tom stated he would be returning the first of May from New York and will be available to any district to make a report - preferably on the week end.

Meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer and the basket passed.

Chairman Bill M. opened the meeting with the Serenity Prayer followed by How it Works and the Traditions. Bill introduced the speaker, Jim L., who shared his experience, strengths and hopes through AA with us. There was a very large crowd in attendance and we thank Jim for sharing with us.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

4/4/82 10:30 a.m.

Chairman Bob S. opened the meeting with the Serenity Prayer followed by welcoming Phyllis back. Phyllis stated she was glad to be back and thanked everyone for their prayers, cards and flowers.

Rhoda called the roll and absent was Dist. #16, Carl V; present all officers and District Committeemen and 4 intergroups were represented.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as mailed out.

The Treasurer Elise reported a balance as of December 31 of \$1,871.76 with group contributions \$1,471.75; miscellaneous collections \$456.77; balance of \$3,800.28. Expenses paid were \$1,485.95 with a cumulative balance of \$2,314.33. Our Prudent Reserve/Savings Account balance is \$4,821.79 not including interest yet credited to the account. A motion was made and passed to approve the financial report.

Bob S. informed the assembly that the North FL Assembly has been approached to host the Southeast Regional Convention in August, 1983. However to confirm this it will be necessary to obtain seed money to reserve the Orlando Twin Towers in the amount of \$1,300 from our Prudent Reserve. Bob commented the seed money would eventually be returned; our only expense would be the loss of interest of this money until returned.

A motion was made that the North Florida Assembly put up seed money in the amount of \$1,300 to obligate the Orlando Twin Towers to host the Southeast Regional Conference in August, 1983. Motion was seconded and passed. (See Delegate's Report - Page #1 for further information)

DELEGATE'S REPORT: In a report from the Delegate's Round-up, Tom stated contributions have increased overall in the country and most of it is being done by the new groups coming in.

The Big Book was recently published in Italian at the cost to GSO of \$25,000 which will be returned through the sale of the Big Book in Italy. This is one of the works of General Service Office which is to lend money to countries so that they can publish the Big Book in their language. However, the main difficulty lies in getting a true translation of the Big Book.

Also noted was the fact that GSO was having trouble getting a Class A Trustee - a nonalcoholic.

The Southeast convention is in Charleston, W. VA August 11-14.

The State convention is July 22/29 in Boca Raton.

The regional forum will be December 3-5 in Nashville.

Tom also mentioned the up coming election of officers in October and our need to look for replacements. The next assembly would be a good time to present these names for consideration.

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PLEASE NOTE: The next quarterly assembly meeting date has been changed to July 31/August 1 in Tallahassee at the Hilton. This was rescheduled due to the State Convention July 22/25.

Bob thanked Districts #9, #10 & #11 for hosting the assembly. M. R. stated 212 registered and he was delighted everyone came and thanked the DCM's and their committees who helped in making this such a good assembly.

Basket was passed and meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

INSTITUTIONAL MEETING

Perry G , Chairman

4/3/82 4 p.m.

Karla B. agreed to chair the Tallahassee meeting later this year.

Discussed in the meeting were the "Duties and Responsibilities of Chairman" and "Closed Meeting Formats"; copies are available.

A letter was discussed from Susan D of GSO who is the Chairman of Correctional Facilities. She advises the need for a new facility directory due to omissions and duplications.

The dissolution of the McLenny groups was brought up and discussed.

Mary of Fernandina brought up the problem of jails demanding full names of outside members and sponsors. Questions of anonymity in small towns was discussed as well as the need to protect the institution, i.e. security. Karla & Perry voiced the need to have perspective of anonymity in this case.

Hank B. pointed out that some ex-cons could be in parole violation doing inside institutional 12 step work and discretion was needed in these areas.

Karla talked of the education of institution personnel as to purpose of AA in the different institutions and how this is done in the indoctrination of new officers in the Florida State prisons which should be kept up.

Need for discretion in giving personal information to inmates, such as, names, phones nos. etc. Comments on keeping the purpose of AA's structure was stressed - not for loans, love, job, etc. Meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

SECRETARY/TREASURER'S MEETING

4/3/82 1 p.m.

Curtis M., Orlando, chaired the meeting with 31 in attendance. Curtis recommended the AA Group" pamphlet which can be ordered through GSO. Worksheets were discussed for group information, such as, officers' names, telephone list, speakers, 12-Step availability, birthday list. Group calendars also are available for treasurers.

Bernie, Orlando Intergroup, commented that Intergroup has a list of 12 Step workers and needs updated lists available for 12 Step work. Individual group secretaries need to keep their local intergroups informed of those available for any kind of 12 Step work.

The question arose of how to get volunteers. Laura, Crystal River, plans to get a list of all members and appoint workers from this list. Curtis, Orlando, stated a 12 month list was posted for all jobs. Bob B., Deland, stated a list of jobs was kept and volunteers were appointed to keep all members active.

Beth, St. Augustine, stated as treasurer of their group they started a money raffle on Wednesday night and a book raffle on Saturday night. This enables them to buy books and extras, such as medallions and birthday cakes.

After questioning the money raffle, Beth explained that the money raffle or "Pot of Gold" was one third of the pot or basket passed and their group has a very high rent. Raffles have made it possible to defray these costs and seems a good incentive to get to meetings.

After discussion of AA principals - attraction rather than promotion - it was realized that these raffles were done within the AA confines keeping it well within the framework of the AA principals. Ed commented that the main responsibility was to keep the group open - namely of survival. He commented it isn't always necessary for all groups to have raffles.

Bernie or Orlando Intergroup stated that only 2/3's of the groups supported their Intergroup. Therefore other functions were held to provide other monies to handle their financial needs.

SECRETARY/TREASURER'S MEETING CONT. Extra functions were held approximately every two months to supplant the General Fund of Intergroup.

Al, Eau Gallie, stated their book raffles help pay for books which they give away.

Curtis discussed the Prudent Fund and suggested a policy to each group holding back a certain amount in case of emergencies. Bob B., Deland, commented about the 60-30-10 pamphlet and that the group comes first before dividing for Intergroup, No. FL and GSO. "Charity begins at Home". Tom, Daytona Beach, had a steering committee meeting because of an over abundance of money in the treasury. They finally bought some new chairs and sent the rest 60-30-10 plan. GSO suggests two months prudent supply in the guidelines. Bob, Secretary of Intergroup, stated they decided three months for a prudent reserve and set aside an amount for this purpose. This amount was taken out of the General Fund and put into certificates drawing interest. Any overage was sent to GSO. Curtis suggested counter signatures on all checks.

Meeting closed after passing the "cup" with the Lord's Prayer.

GSR WORKSHOP

4/3/82 2:30 p.m.

M. R. J chaired the meeting standing in for John Van. The panel consisted of Al Is , Brevard County, Marie G , Orlando/Winter Park and Joe M , Daytona Beach who represented their local intergroups. There were approximately 100 present.

M. R. opened the discussion with the quote "Whenever anyone anywhere reaches out for help, I want the hand of AA always to be there - for that, I AM RESPONSIBLE". Two important aspects of Intergroup service were presented for panel discussion.

Introducing more of our members into service.

How are we growing for the need for planned sponsorship within institutions, etc.

Al of Brevard commented on a letter Joe M read to Brevard Co. regarding sponsorship. Al commented these items were needed for stimulation, interest and participation: newsletter every month, N. Y. eve party, active answering service and immediate temporary sponsorship until a new member can obtain group affiliation & choose a sponsor; white chip for newcomer.

Joe of Daytona stated he had experienced help from New York and they patterned intergroup services from the by-laws of Orlando. He stated finding no trouble getting volunteers for answering phones; suggested a 12 Step sponsor list which has worked very well for the past money. He suggested a temporary AA sponsor, such as - two days before release a tempory sponsor be assigned; obtain all release dates from institutions and assure contact with AA.

Marie of Orlando has been with Orlando//Winter Park Intergroup 9 years starting with 16 groups and 38 meetings a week to 54 groups and 120 meetings. Marie stated their intergroup has workshops and intergroup volunteer card files for 12 Step lists requiring one year sobriety. For institutional work, volunteers are used for schools, prisons, institutions, treatment programs, etc. The 'Intergrouper' is a monthly newsletter which started with 100 and is now up to 1,000 a month. Instead of one workshop for volunteers, there a four yearly. They also promote younger members into volunteer service.

After the panel talk, there was discussion for getting a institutional chairman. Also, it was recommended that when more than one answering service doing the same function, it is best to incorporate all names on the list.

Marie discussed financial aids, such as, garage sales, banquets, Can-Do Reviews and round-ups. A Round-up is a pot luck meal with AA raffle with an al-non & AA speakers. The Can Do Review is a talent show with all groups participating. Good fun and involvement help finances!

Question: Why is there an intergroup Office? It is imperative to have an answering service available at all times. Brought out was the need for more meetings regarding sponsorship; an up-dated sponsor list for intergroup offices and the availability of literature of the guidelines for intergroup offices and group conscience.

Meeting adjourned after the basket was passed with the Lord's Prayer.

Mitch opened the meeting with the Serenity Prayer. There were about 85 in attendance.

Tom D., Tallahassee, reported that the video tapes are now being used by the TV station in that area. There was also a taping of an interview in one member's home (all in accordance with our Traditions). Of the 15 minutes of taping, it was edited to 3 minutes of air time. The three radio stations in that area have also been contacted about some tapes. The next project is to cooperate with the Health Fair to be held next month.

Ruth K., Oxford Group, reports the OPEN HOUSE is working well. Flyers are put out listing 7 speakers (limited and timed to 5 minutes each) consisting of professionals, repeaters, minorities, Ala-teen and Al-anons. They have been scheduling this on an annual basis.

Rhoda reported that Brevard County was in the process of putting their meeting list booklets in all police and fire stations, hospitals and treatment centers, doctor's offices (where permitted) and the Salvation Army. The Court Program has been using these books for a number of years referring people to open meetings only.

Porter B., Cocoa Beach, commented on the help from the TODAY newspaper. They have a Public Service column called DATE BOOK. This gives a daily listing of all meetings, time and place in Brevard County. The three answering service numbers are also listed.

At present there are no GPC (Co-operating with the Professional Community) committees. Literature and a work book have been received and hopefully, we can get this started.

In regard to referrals from treatment centers, some of them do call an AA member in the home area of the patient being released. However, it seems that most of the centers are recommending their own After-Care program. The person then returns for a weekly meeting of this instead of or in addition to an AA meeting.

After passing the basket, the meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Bob B. critiqued an article on "Step Eleven - Meditation" and Mary B. read an article on "Shut Up and Listen". Afterward, there was good group discussion.

Ellen pointed out the many items available in Grapevine literature. The Grapevine is the publisher for all the slogans, the Serenity Prayer, the Preamble - all for a small price.

The meeting was well attended and closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Bob Wl , Acting Chairman, opened the meeting with a moment of silent meditation followed by the Serenity Prayer. Bob told us that Scotty had resigned as Chairman and a new one would be appointed by the next meeting. There were fifteen present.

Bob mentioned the ten tapes which were recorded at Daytona Beach were still available for use by any group. Contact Daytona Beach Intergroup Services, 114 North Helm Place, Daytona Beach 32014 - Phone 904-252-1303.

Ways for reaching the handicapped blind with these tapes was discussed - one suggestion being to contact the Lion's Club. Also the Bureau of Blind Services formerly located in Atlanta, GA is now located in Daytona Beach and covers the entire southeastern area of the country. Suggestion was made that a copy of each tape be given to the Bureau for distribution; also to the State of FL Bureau of Blind Services at the FL State University, Tallahassee.

Getting a letter out to Special Services at schools was suggested.

As for our personal and group involvement, let us keep in mind to keep in contact with the handicapped in our own area on a visitation basis. Another suggestion was more involvement in the Handicapped Program by Al-anon and Ala-teen groups.

There is need for individual groups to make all groups aware of the handicapped.

"Reaching out" must start with "me" to carry the message back to the group and also to participate in helping the handicapped. One way might be to tape your group meeting and carry it to the handicapped member.

One member stated that all speakers at meetings should endeavor to speak loudly enough and clearly enough so that those with a hard of hearing or deaf problem will be able to understand them.

Tom stated that as one with cerebral palsy, by being different in presenting something of a serious nature together with some humor, that people will be prompted to remark "who is that nut? - not "who is that handicapped person?"

The meeting closed with a reminder for all of us that "a handicap is what you make out of it"

Meeting closed with basket being passed and with the Lord's Prayer.
