FIRST QUARTERLY MINUTES OF NORTH FLORIDA AREA OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUSJanuary 10 - 11, 1987 - Titusville, FL.

OFFICERS' & DCMS' COMM. MTG., Sat., Jan. 10, 1987, 4:30 P.M. Chmn., Tom D [REDACTED], opened with a moment of meditation, followed by the Serenity Prayer. Secty., Pat N [REDACTED], called the roll - Absent - DCM #4, DCM #18. Rosters for 1987/88 were given out.

Minutes of last meeting approved as mailed. Treasurer's Report approved as read. Balance on hand 12/31/86 - \$10,847.65; Prudent Reserve, 12/31/86 - \$8,973.26.

It was approved that presentation be made at General Assembly for voting on addition of new district #23 (covering a portion of District 12). Tabled until April Assembly will be request for a new group to be formed, covering a portion of District 6. Approval is to be obtained from all groups now presently in District 6. Revision of updated N.Fl. Area map is still in process.

New Business: Relative to the finances of North Florida Treasury, Chairman, Tom D [REDACTED], spoke of our considering putting funds, prudently, towards the defraying of members' expenses to outside AA functions, i.e. Southeastern Regional Forums, etc.

Second matter of new business - Calendar Listing of remaining 1987 quarterly Assemblies, and the listing for 1988, which are as follows:

1987: 2nd quarter - April 4-5, Jacksonville;
3rd quarter - July 25-26, Orlando
4th quarter - October 10-11, Ocala

1988: 1st quarter - Jan. 16-17, Crystal River
2nd quarter - Apr. 9-10, St. Augustine
3rd quarter - July 16-17, Tallahassee
4th quarter - Oct. 15-16, Election Assembly, Tenative-Deland or Orlando.

Delegate, Dick P [REDACTED], handed out to DCMS copies of "The Challenge of the Seventh Tradition", which came from GSO, and which was discussed at the December, 1986 Southeast Regional Forum, in Alabama. See detailed Delegate's Report in General Assembly Meeting, Sun., Jan. 12, 1987. Meeting adjourned at 5:30 P.M., with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

OPEN SPEAKER MEETING, Sat., Jan. 10, 1987, 8:30 P.M. John B [REDACTED], General Service Manager of General Service Office, New York, shared his story with us .

GENERAL ASSEMBLY, Sunday, Jan. 11, 1987, 10:30 A.M. Chmn., Tom D [REDACTED], opened the meeting with a moment of meditation, followed by the Serenity Prayer. Roll call taken - Absent were DCMS 4, 16, and 19. Minutes were approved as mailed. Treasurer's Report approved as read.

Committee Reports given - see attached pages.

Chairman, Tom D [REDACTED], reported on the District Committee Members/Officers meeting - stating that consideration should be given to prudently using some of our monies toward the defraying of expenses of trusted servants in attending important AA forums and conferences which are beneficial in the continuing growth of the North Florida Assembly membership. As approved at this meeting, a request was made by D.C. S [REDACTED] that the General Assembly vote on splitting District 12 into two separate districts. Motion made and seconded, affirmatively, that District 12 be separated into two districts - District 12 and 23. Tom also advised that request made for splitting of District 6 be tabled, pending full approval of all groups now in District 6.

General Assembly, cont'd: John B [redacted], General Manager of General Service Office in New York, was introduced, and told us that he was impressed with the quality, effort, and vigor of our interest in service work. The majority of us were privileged to hear him speak at the Saturday night meeting.

Delegates Report: Dick P [redacted] gave the following report - "Since being elected delegate at our Assembly in Orlando, Oct., 1986, my primary function has been to receive a lot of mail, and also to attend the Southeast Regional Forum, held in Montgomery, Alabama, Dec. 5-7, 1986, with 300 plus attendance. I was designated to attend in place of Bob S [redacted], our outgoing delegate, who was unable to go. Hopefully, several of you will be able to attend in the future. I have filed the complete Regional Report from GSO with our secretary; also, copies of this report were given to each DCM at the 4:30 P.M. meeting, Sat., 1/10/87.. The next Forum will be in Puerto Rico in May, 1987, with the 1988 Forum to be held in Miami.

My comments concerning this forum: Anyone who is entering service work in AA, and most particularly those becoming DCMs, should try to attend one of these forums. Every conceivable area of service work is open to discussion. Here are a few items highlighted: The Theme of the upcoming conference in New York, in April, 1987, will be "The Challenge of the Seventh Tradition". We have had correspondence on this, through myself to the DCMs, some of who have responded to me and to John B [redacted] at GSO, concerning this subject. In essence, we are referring to the fact that more and more of our income in New York is the result of sales of literature and books to outside agencies. We, therefore, are becoming less and less "self-supporting".

Your attention to this matter, as DCMs and GSRs is vital. If we are to maintain our autonomy (Trad.#4) as a fellowship, as we always have, we need to be independent and self-supporting. It is my hope that each DCM in this assembly will try to meet with their GSRs at an early date. Some have already moved in this direction. Hopefully, you may accomplish two objectives in your meeting - 1. To become more understanding of the need to inform each group of the importance of our 7th Tradition; 2. To come to understand, through the Forum Report (which each DCM has) of the real spirit and dedication of our service structure and of service people in GSO. who attend the Forums.

Workshops were held on Saturday, and Madeleine C [redacted] was there from our Assembly (DCM #15) to chair the workshop on Treatment Facilities. The report summarized the other workshops. There is one particular question & answer I would like to include in the next Forum "Ask-It-Basket" session, as pertinent to our 7th Tradition Challenge (P.14 of report).

It is the hope of your delegate, as I begin my term as your trusted servant, that I may carry your message well. Several of you - D.C. S [redacted] and Vic S [redacted] - have already responded to the 7th Tradition Challenge with their communications to myself and to New York. My comment regarding service work and service people as we show our dedication by the way we carry the message - "so shall others do likewise". Let me hear from you as I prepare for my trip to the Minb-Conference in Atlanta in February, and the Gen'. Serv. Conf. in New York in April. - God bless.

INSTITUTIONAL (CORR/PRISON) FACILITIES Bob S [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 1/10/87 11:00 A.M.

Meeting opened with moment of silence, followed by the Serenity Prayer. In Attendance - 60
The film library was discussed - suggestion made that a list of films be sent with newsletter.
Question asked regarding using money from prison welfare fund, if offered. It is OK.
Also asked if, when the basket is passed, if the group is not receiving funds for AA from these collections. If not, they should stop putting in. In cases like this, try to meet with the superintendent to discuss purchasing AA literature and supplies.
Problems regarding obtaining clearance for ex-convicts to attend meetings were discussed.
Wayne, from Cocoa Work Release, spoke and expressed his amazement at everyone pulling together to get meetings taken inside.
Meeting closed with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

DISABILITIES Tom C [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 1/10/87 11:00 A.M.

Meeting opened in usual manner. Attendance - 40 present.
Chmn., Tom C [redacted], gave definition for "Disability" as "Anything that interferes with an AA member getting the full benefit of AA".
He reported that Orlando is getting a Telecommunication Device at the Intergroup Office, for the deaf. Also noted that SHHH stands for self-help (for) hard of hearing (does not mean for hearing impaired-deaf). There was much discussion about uses for the telecommunication device.
Re Non-Smoking: suggestions: 1.-Boomed (?) in Jacksonville from 2 to 12; 2.- Need rules to keep people from smoking before meetings; 3.-Need quiet smoke-eaters; 4.-Candies burn out smoke in meeting.
Discussion on Wheelchair accessibility. Talking Books now has Big Book, 1st Edition, on tape, with professional readers. GSO has 12 Steps rewritten to easily put into sign language. The Big Book is also, now, in large print and in Braille. Loners' and Internationalists' meetings also in print.
Discussion on Drugs - Don't tell people to stop taking properly prescribed medications. Speaking of this drug problem at meetings sensitizes others to not play God. We deal with alcohol and alcoholism, not drugs..
Tom also opened the report at General Assembly by telling us we are "TAB" - temporarily able-bodied. For those who have nothing wrong now - "we'll get you sooner or later"..
Meeting adjourned with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

Attendance - 55 present. Meeting opened in usual manner. Show of hands indicated nearly one-half of the 55 in attendance, were attending their first N.Fl. Area Assembly. Chairman spent most of the meeting giving basic P.I. background aimed at these service newcomers. Items covered included: The two basic responsibilities of PI are to carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic through the media, and to keep AA members and groups informed. (In areas without CPC committees, PI also handles communications with third-party professionals). The importance of the Traditions in PI work was stressed.

The PI Notebook was discussed. Chairman introduced the new Area PI Newsletter. Samples of a District Newsletter and a flyer for area assemblies were also distributed as examples of what can be done for PI within AA.

A discussion of Traditions 7 and 4, as they relate to GSO finances was held. One member suggested individuals send birthday contributions to GSO - envelopes used to be readily available. One member stressed that the basket is AA money. Judy P. and others shared how they handle speaking to civic groups. Jacksonville member shared they have TV spots on five TV stations, and reports good success with a simple "Problem with Alcohol? Call xxx-xxxx. No dues or fees." The importance of having one person only as contact for newspaper coverage - particularly meeting info. - was noted by several members. Get to know the editors and reporters of your paper.

The Chairman ended meeting by challenging attendees to carry their enthusiasm and the service message back to their home groups and districts. Be the one the meeting chairman automatically turns to when they ask "Any Announcements?" at end of meeting.

Meeting adjourned with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

Acting Secretary, Judy P [redacted]

Attendance - 76 present. Meeting opened in usual manner. An up-date on CPC activities from GSO was given from the GSO quarterly report. A section from the Southeastern Regional Forum was also read. In it, CPC was likened to a wholesaler and P.I. as a retailer, in that CPC has to do with informing the non-alcoholic professional, and P.I. tries to reach the individual alcoholic directly. This Forum report also mentioned that it is just as important to educate our own members and groups about CPC, as to not only what it is, but what it would like to accomplish.

Discussions followed on the influx of court-referred people to our meetings; what to do if the meeting place grew too small; how to accommodate our own members and the new people, too. Attendance verification to satisfy the courts was discussed. The Forum report suggested that attendance forms and perhaps a rubber stamp to protect personal anonymity be provided by the Court System or treatment programs requiring attendance information. We were also reminded that attendance does not guarantee sobriety.

Discussion followed re ways to carry the message to the suffering alcoholic behind bars. Paul and Bernie from Dist. 20 talked about their work at V.C.I. (Volusia Correctional Institution) - the frustrations and the rewards. Gerry F., CPC chairperson from Dist. 20 reported that their target audience would be the medical profession - that plans were shaping up slowly.

Other Districts shared their experience in working with over-worked probation and parole officers; what to do about un-interested judges, etc.

Carrying the message to High Schools, via the Guidance Counselors, was discussed, and will be the topic of a CPC meeting in Orlando, January 23, 1987 (Smitty reported).

The CPC newsletter, the "CONNECTION" will be compiled and mailed to DCMs. Another plea was made for any news/ideas regarding CPC. These can be mailed directly to me, or called in.

My address and phone # are on the roster - also listed following minutes of General Assembly meeting.

AA's exhibit for professionals will be in place/the Adult Children of Alcoholics National Conference, Mar. 1 - 4, 1987, in Orlando. Volunteers to man the booth were needed (approx. 12 people here signed up).

CFC, cont'd: On a final note, Class A Trustee, Jim Ertelle was quoted as saying "AA's first Fifty Years is a solid foundation of sharing and caring on which to build the next Fifty Years. Part of AA's future is right now locked up in jails, prisons, and juvenile detention centers. If that thought bothers you, even a little bit, let's change it." Meeting adjourned with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer. P. S.: We are also informed that libraries have the Big Book on records called "Talking Books" and they are free (sometimes they have the 12 And 12 also).

Attendance - Approx. 60. Meeting opened in usual manner, and began with 1.-introduction of people attending; 2.-a reading of "What is a Central Office"; 3.-Question and Answer session: a. Encouragement of new groups to register/contribute - only approx. 30.6 contribute at this time - Districts 13, 23, and 12 shared views on this; b. Encouragement of having volunteers to become active in home groups/intergroups; c. Things we can do to raise funds in home groups - 1. Bake Sale; 2. Sports league; 3. 5 yr. plan-"All we have to do is contribute \$1.25 per yr. to GSO; 4. Separate collection basket for Intergroup, only; 5. Ask birthday people to contribute \$1.00 for each yr. of sobriety to Intergroup. 4. Ways to generate interest: a. publish donations of ea. group in monthly newsletter, or a yr. to date report; b. Send notice to each grp. thanking them for their contribution & amount of contribution (even if it's zero); c. encourage members that service is way to stay sober because it gets you out of self, and it keeps you from drinking; d. spell out what is needed and take it to your group conscience meeting; e. utilize retirees/housewives in service - they have the time to do it - also people who are unemployed, and young people; f. have mailing lists to solicit funds; g. Prayer, Confidence, and Faith - No AA group that we know of has ever gone broke; h. Make Intergroup functions affordable (rent schools, civic auditoriums, etc.); i. use suggested 60-Intergroup Contr.; 30-GSO contr.; 10-Area contr. of group monies, and tell group members how the money is being distributed, and why; j. Annual Picnic/ Gratitude Banquets (Merritt Island said their current one goes to GSO); k. Dances - good fund raiser. 5. Ways to generate interest in Intergroup - a. keep home groups aware of Intergroup activities via newsletter and intergroup representative; b. we tend to forget that the Intergroup is part of the AA structure - reinforce that this is also part of service to AA; c. touch base with other home groups about what your home group needs and what you're doing about it; d. let people you sponsor know about Intergroup, GSO and Area, and what they can do if they continue to stay sober; e. Start at home group level-encourage importance of maintaining traditions - announce before meeting starts. It was stated that literature is a big money raiser, but it should not be the only way to raise money. Literature sales should go only to publish literature. Request was made that there be an "Ask-It-Basket" at regular assemblies - the purpose being to exchange ideas. Meeting adjourned with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer. INSTITUTIONAL (HOSPITAL/TREATMENT)

Madeleine C [REDACTED], Chmn. Sat., 1/10/87

3:00 P.M.

Attendance - 70. Meeting opened with moment of silence, followed by the Serenity Prayer. Madeleine asked for District Representatives for Treatment Facilities Committee. She explained various literature, including The Workbook, used in working with the committee, and again made available The Workbook Guidelines (excerpts from The Workbook). A question was asked concerning problems of AA being combined with other self-help programs within the facilities. Many shared ideas, such as: gearing meetings to discussion on alcohol/alcoholism, rather than other drugs or other problems; make it clear at the start of meeting that we talk about recovery from alcoholism (much of this is up to the person chairing the meeting; also, talk to the director or staff member concerning these problems, and explain the Third Tradition which is - The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking.. Madeleine gave a brief report on the Southeast Regional Forum in Montgomery, Ala., on Dec. 5-7, 1986, at which she conducted The Treatment Facilities Workshop. Our problems are universal.

ARCHIVES REPORT, cont'd: A two-drawer file cabinet has been procured for safekeeping. The records are being sorted and resorted into an orderly condition. If anyone has in his or her possession historic records of the North Florida Area Assemblies, they are encouraged to make them available for use in North Florida Archives. If members do not wish to part with originals, copies could be made for Archives! Several members have offered to assist in establishing the Archives, and the help of G30 has been solicited. Progress will be reported at subsequent meetings, beginning with 2nd quarterly meeting in April, 1987.

SECRETARY/TREASURER MEETING

Attendance - 40 Approx.

The importance of the "Three Legacies" of A.A. was explained and that members wishing to participate in service work should become familiar with them. It was suggested that members being considered for group office need to have:

1. a concern for the group's welfare.
2. a period of sobriety.
3. a sense of responsibility for service to others.
4. a sense of humor.

General duties for secretaries and treasurers contained in the pamphlet "The A.A. Group" were reviewed. It was stressed that duties may vary from group to group, and that, in small groups, a member may have more than one office. Each officer should be provided with the pamphlet, "The A.A. Group".

Secretaries need to be good all around group servants.

How funds are used should be of concern to the treasurer and regular treasurer's reports be given. A bank account, preferably with two signatures, is encouraged. Group identification numbers are important to be included when group contributions are made, and also the Group's name.

General discussion: 1. Some groups have difficulty in opening bank accounts, due to large service fees and/or requirements for tax identification numbers. North Florida Area Assembly is awaiting its Federal Employer I.D., following which application for Sales Tax, State, will be forthcoming. Meanwhile, it is suggested, if you are in an Area with an Intergroup Office, use the State Sales Tax Exempt number; 2. Difficulty in getting members to serve as officers can be helped by having effective sponsorship; 3. How to handle members with strong personalities, who disrupt meetings. Suggestion - "WITH LOVE AND TOLERANCE"; 4. Some Groups are having trouble with their financial arrangements with Clubs. Suggestions are -

- a. Stick to Traditions.
- b. Write G.S.O. for clarification and information; also read Guidelines.
- c. Remember that a Group's primary purpose is to help alcoholics recover through the Twelve Steps.

Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.
