THIRD QUARTERLY MINUTES OF NORTH FLORIDA AREA OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

July 24-25-26, 1987 - Altamonte Spgs., FL.

OFFICERS' & DCMS' Comm. Mtg., Sat. July 25, 1987, 4:00 P.M.: Chmn., Tom D [redacted], opened with a moment of meditation, followed by the Serenity Prayer. Secty., Pat N [redacted], called the roll - Absent - Alt. Chmn., DCMS 2, 4, 8, 16, 25.

Minutes of last meeting were corrected - Page 2, the last motion corrected to read "Upon motion made and seconded, it was approved to have 1 Tradition discussed at the General Service Representatives Meeting at each quarterly Assembly (deletion of word "Concept"). Meetings were then approved as mailed.

Treasurer's Report approved as read. Balance on Hand 6/30/87 - \$7,042.50; Prudent Reserve - \$9,196.41.

Per Pat N [redacted] - All DCMS are to have Alternates listed on Roster - give information to Pat. Also, mail directly to Pat the Group Change Forms (which you receive from New York), when changes are made. This expedites getting the info. to Pat for N. Fl., and to New York - she sends them on.

OLD BUSINESS: Dick G [redacted] requested that the amount towards purchase of new computer be changed from \$300.00 to \$800.00. Motion made and seconded for \$800.00 in purchase of new computer. This motion will be presented at the General Assembly for approval.

Subject of Bulk Mailing is tabled to next quarterly meeting for voting.

Traditions included in next General Service Representatives Meetings.

Maps done by Bill S [redacted] were given out at this meeting. Advise if there are any corrections to be made to same.

Tom D [redacted] reported that he advised New York to check with South Florida re the St. Petersburg meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: 1. Re Election Voting procedure - only duly elected members are to be present at this meeting. Get a committee together to handle procedures. Tom D [redacted] asked Jimmy G [redacted] to be Chairman of Credentials Committee. Note - N. Fl. Election Meeting will be held in Deland, FL., October 15-16, 1988, at the Deland Hilton. 2. Following discussion re changing the time of meetings on the Agenda for quarterly mtgs., Chairman, Tom D [redacted], recommended that the DCMS poll all the groups in their districts relative to beginning the Saturday meetings at an earlier time - i.e. 9:45 A.M., as suggested by DCM23, also P.I. Chmn. D.C. Stultz. Change in meeting times to be voted on at the 4th Qtly. mtg. in October.

3. Delegate, Dick P [redacted], had copies of 12 Concepts Illustrated, which are to be given out Sunday, at the General Assembly.

4. District 13 will be splitting into two districts, pending letter of authorization to the N. Fl. Area Assembly Chairman from the DCM13. Sumter County has 8 groups with 200 AA members, and needs N. Fl. directions on setting up a new district.

5. Change in meeting date for the 4th quarterly meeting in Ocala to OCT. 23-24-25, 1987.

Don P [redacted], Trustee at Large, will be the speaker, and also will share at the Correctional Facilities Meeting.

Meeting adjourned 5:30 P.M., with basket passed and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

OPEN SPEAKER MEETING, Sat., 7/25/87, 8:30 P.M.: Jim J [redacted], Chmn., introduced Bill O [redacted], who shared a strong, heartwarming message of his experience, strength and hope as a recovering alcoholic.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY, Sun., 7/26/87, 9:30 A.M.: Chmn., Tom D [redacted], opened the meeting with a moment of meditation, followed by the Serenity Prayer. Roll call taken- Absent DCM#4,#8,#21,#25, Intergroup Rep.#1,2,3,4,#5,#6,#8,19,20,21,#13,#22. Total members present - 140. Minutes were approved, following correction - deletion of word "Concept" from motion made at last meeting to hold discussion on one Tradition at each GSR. meeting. Treasurer's report approved as read (see DCM/OFF meeting re figures). Elise stated that the correct total contributed by Dist.#25 in SUMMARY should read 135.35. She also reported that a contribution from the Young Peoples' Convention was made since June 30th, and will appear in next Treasurer's Report.

Tom D [redacted], Chmn., thanked the Host Groups of Districts 9,10,11, & 18, for their time and effort in setting up the accomodations for this quarterly meeting. He also read "thank you" note from Phyllis D. for the love and caring support and the lovely floral arrangement of all the members in the death of her husband, Tom, who died (as a sober A.A. member) July 3, 1987. He also announced that Tom Lepinski did the ~~drinks~~ Traditions 1 and 2 at the GSR meeting, Saturday.

Pat N [redacted] and Elise D [redacted] gave brief reports on the Puerto Rico Regional Forum, held May 15-17; Pat referred to John B [redacted] (Gen'l. Mgr. G30) statement that G30 does the jobs that we can't do. He gave the history of AA. She also found that the Puerto Rican A.A.ers are fabulous for their warmth, friendliness, and enthusiasm for the program. Elise stated that it is a spiritual experience - that she finds also at all types of AA meetings. At this forum, said Elise, there was a sense of communication even tho some of us did not speak the same language. As she so aptly put it, we "carry the message" not preach it.

Committee Reports were given - see attached pages.

DELEGATE'S REPORT: Given by Dick P [redacted], Delegate, on the General Service Conference, held in New York, in April - highlights are as follows: 1. These Conferences began in 1950, with 135 members attending; 2. Dick listed all of the Committees on the Agenda for the week, and observed that the agenda outside of committee meetings was too lengthy to describe in detail; 3. June 16, 1987 AA celebrated its 52nd birthday, and this 37th Conference felt that the time had come for AA as a whole to take a long look at "self-support" throughout the entire service structure. The theme, therefore, was "THE SEVENTH TRADITION - A TURNING POINT". It was noted that the issue of self-support is a tradition that has saved our fellowship - thanks to the vision of Mr. Rockefeller many years ago. GSO has been concerned about the increasing income coming in from Non-AA sources for publishing, and the increasing reliance upon publishing income to support group services and necessary GSO activities - expenses which should be covered by group contributions. However, GSO noted that contributions from groups have increased since the call went out six (6) months ago, and as a result, a price reduction of 12% is planned for August 1, 1987. There are about 1,556,000 AA members, and growing - therefore, the need for self-support is ever present!; The Daily Reflections book is in process of being worked on; Open and Closed Meeting statement for reading at AA meetings has been approved as a service item now, and will be Conference Approved later; Dick suggested N. Fl. hold workshops on the Service Manual and the 12 Concepts at the quarterly meetings; Dick will serve in 1988, as Alternate Chairperson of the 1988 Gen'l. Serv. Conf.; Taken from the closing talk, Dick quoted "I leave you now with the faith and trust that the present trusted servants and servants yet to come will continue to abide by our Declaration of Unity - i.e. "This we owe to AA's future: To place our common welfare first; to keep our fellowship united. For on AA Unity depends our lives and the lives of those to come.; Dick thanked North Florida for their trust in him and his being able to experience sharing in the deep feeling of dedication at the Conference. He has copies of a thorough, well written report (Secty, PGD's comment) for you who care to have one; also he will give this report at your District Committee meeting, upon request.

The following items were presented by Tom D [redacted], Chmn: 1. October date for 4th quarterly meeting to be held in Ocala on OCTOBER 23-24-25, 1987, at the Holiday Inn, State Road 40 and I-75; 2. Discussion on Bulk Mailing is tabled until October meeting, at which time it is to be voted upon or tabled further; 3. Jimmy G [redacted] will be Chairman of Credentials Procedures meeting; 4. Workshop on Guidelines for Host Groups re setting up quarterly meetings, will be chaired by Curtis M [redacted]; 5. Assembly voted to approve \$800.00 for purchase of new computer; Don P [redacted], Trustee-At-Large, will be the keynote speaker at October meeting; Motion made and

GEN'L ASSEMBLY, cont'd: seconded to create new District, following split of District #13, upon N. Fl. receiving letter of no objection by the groups in District 13, from the DCM, Fred

Tom D. [redacted], Chmn., in closing, stated: "We in North Florida are AA in this area, and we, of this Assembly "pass it on" to continue carrying the message to the still suffering alcoholic".

Meeting adjourned 11:45 A.M., basket having been passed earlier, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES Bob S. [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 7/25/87 11:00 A.M.

Attendance - 46; Contribution - \$30.50 Meeting was opened with the Serenity Prayer. Bob announced that Don P. [redacted], Trustee-At-Large, will be the speaker at the October Assembly. His experience as an ex-convict/recovering alcoholic should offer some helpful input at our next Correctional Facilities Meeting.

The problem of "Jailhouse Religion" and inmate "preaching" at AA meetings was brought up for discussion; Bob Scott met with the Program Director for the D.O.C. - however, he was not formally introduced, and would like to have more information from him concerning Guidelines for Inside Sponsors; A list of inmates who would like to correspond with outside AAs is available. For more information contact Bob S [redacted]

.; The question of clearance for ex-convicts at Correctional Facilities' Mtgs. was discussed - administrative policy varies at different facilities.; In closing, it was emphasized that Institutional Guidelines always takes precedence over AA Guidelines. At most facilities, a minimum of 1 year outside sobriety is required for admittance to inside AA meetings; and that any questions or difficulty with administrative policy that come up, should be discussed with the prison superintendent, or his assistant.

Meeting closed, with basket passed, and the Lord's prayer.

PUBLIC INFORMATION D.C. S. [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 7/25/87 11:00 A.M.

Attendance - 70. Meeting opened in usual manner,, with the Serenity Prayer. For the benefit of the newcomers to the P.I. meeting, the chairman recapped the purpose of P.I. - 1. To carry the message through the media; 2. To carry information about AA to its members and groups; 3. To carry to the areas without an active CPC committee, the message through third party professionals. 1. Chairman briefly listed the goals given in the Newsletter to date, and shared his experience in trying to do those items. AA directories were discussed - they are available at a cost of only \$.75, and each group should have one at their meetings. Another pitch is for groups to order the 10 copy batch of the Box 459 issues for \$3.50.

2. Chairman read the "Open" and "Closed" meeting statements approved by GSO (See pages 42 & 43 of the August Grapevine).

3. George C., the Brevard Cty. AA New Year's Eve Party Chmn., gave a discourse on the ins and outs of publicizing an AA function. He assured the attendees that he had lots of experience - that while he was drinking, he helped organize the Brevard Octoberfest!

4. A lively question and answer discussion session was conducted - Topics included: What's the difference between a group conscience meeting and a business meeting?; How can we get unregistered groups to register? Why Register? The input was varied and valuable. One suggestion was to read "More than just money", page 7 in the August Grapevine.

Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

GRAPEVINE Dick C. [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 7/25/87 11:00 A.M.

Grapevine Attendance - 38. Meeting opened with Serenity Prayer. 1. Discussion item - that the Grapevine was Conference Approved in 1985 - this clarified question that it was not by many AA members; 2. For discussion - getting a Group to have a GVR (Grapevine Representative) who will be active; 3. Discussion re Grapevine in other countries - Grapevines from Scotland and England were made available to read during the Assembly; 4. We discussed using the Grapevine publisher's definition of open and closed meetings - these are not official or GSO approved, but they are a start to a common definition.; Dick announced that \$190.00 of literature was sold at this Assembly!

Meeting closed, with basket passed, and the Lord's Prayer.

CPC (Cooperation/Prof. Community)

Bobbe Ly, Chmn.

Sat., 7/25/87

1:30 P.M.

Meeting opened in usual manner. On the agenda for this Workshop - CPC Reps. from Dists. #12 and #23 to conduct panel discussion facsimile of actual CPC presentation to professional community: First, Bobbe Ly, chairperson, gave update on CPC activities in N. Fl. area, which included: Dist. #22, Flagler Cty. CPC activity has recently included a "within AA" survey of how best to reach out to professionals, that resulted in a mailing to 100 professionals (clergy, physicians, law enforcement, and health agencies, as well as various civic groups). It was decided that Dist. #22 should win the Golden Alkie award - however Alkie is laid up and in need of repair (he did not have a slip!) so the torch was passed symbolically.

Next was the panel presentation by Joe S., Marty G., Victor G., and Bill H. - target-audience probation officers. A handout at the end of the excellent presentation outlined areas covered. There were six (6) general areas - 1. What AA is; 2. How started; 3. 12 Steps to Recovery; 4. Personal story; 5. Local AA resources; 6. Question and Answer. The panel was so good that a number of people wished they had a video of the presentation to use as a CPC service training tool.

As a result of watching the presentation, members from Dist. #21 set up a meeting date to discuss CPC start-up work.

In closing, Bobbe noted that one way to handle the complaints that the Courts and Treatment Centers are dumping their case loads on AA, is to meet with them, give them open meeting lists and tell them what AA can and cannot do (as outlined in our Traditions) - there is a free pamphlet on What AA Can and Cannot Do, also. In Guidelines (all GSRs should have copies of these from GSO, they come in the packet to the GSR with Service Manual, etc.) on Cooperation With Court A.S.A.P., and Similar Programs, on Page Two, there is a very good commentary on judges wanting to get some help for alcoholics from A.A., the best source of help they know of.

Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

Attendance - 39. Meeting opened in usual manner, with Serenity Prayer. Members advised that Groups can order Box 4-5-9, 10 copies, issued every two months, for only \$3.50 yearly. Please identify yourself as an AA member in your request. Statements of Purpose may be ordered from GSO. - Order all literature from GSO, Address: A.A. World Services, Inc., Box 459, Grand Central Station, New York, N.Y., 10163.

Questions discussed were: 1. How does group become self-supporting, when paying such a large percentage to a club; 2. Can clubs sell literature; 3. Do groups have separate bank accounts; Do they have a reserve; How do they separate money?; 4. How can groups generate more income; 5. What is 60-30-10 plan; 6. Has your group been approached about liability insurance yet; 7. Do groups purchase medallions for everyone.

These questions were discussed, and answered, as follows: 1. By addressing the fact and asking for more money; 2. Only groups should sell literature; 3. Most groups carry their own checking account, and most have a prudent reserve of 1 to 3 mos, - group conscience determines how rest of money is spent; 4. Raffles, with literature being raffled off; on anniversary each member put in a penny a day extra - total of \$3.65 per year additional; raffle off Grapevine subscription; 5. 60% to Intergroup; 30% to Area; 10% to New York; 6. One group has been approached by Church to help pay for ~~ITS LIABILITY INSURANCE~~ liability insurance at church - Group moved its meeting 7. Most groups purchased medallions only for recognized active member - issue determined by group conscience.

Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

DISABILITIES

Meeting opened in usual manner. Definition of "Disability" - "Anything that interferes with an AA member receiving the full benefit of an AA meeting - i.e. Blind, confined to wheel chair, breathing disorder, inability to tolerate smoke, hard of hearing, and last but not least, "hard of head!" In AA we learn to live by the "Love and Tolerance Code".

It was noted that in St. Augustine, the AA program is available to the School for Deaf and Blind in Braille.

The AA way of life is the common language of the heart. Also for those of us who are "T.A.B.", (meaning temporarily able-bodied), sooner or later we will qualify for the Disability meeting!

There are many non-smoking meetings being started in all N.Fl. Districts. Love and tolerance is our code here. The spirit of cooperation is essential. We don't ever want to become "Them Non-Smokers" against the "Smokers".

A list of members who speak a language other than English would be very helpful to draw from when we have a visitor from another country attending meetings in our districts.

Many members have learned to read in AA, through starting with Chapter Five-How It Works.

Older members often have difficulty driving at night. We need their experience, strength and hope. Offer them a ride. Young mothers in AA can swap baby sitting with others, so they can get to a meeting - remember when we swapped baby sitting so we could go out drinking!

Please remember we are not doctors. Do not interfere with another member's prescribed medication.

If you think someone is over-medicating, use the pamphlet "The AA Member, Alcohol and Other Drugs". Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

TREATMENT FACILITIES

Beverly F. , Chmn.

Sat., 7/25/87 3:00 P.M.

Attendance - 53 Meeting opened with the Serenity Prayer. Handouts were distributed on working with the traditions, Guidelines for carrying the message inside facilities, and letter to professionals, centers, and hospitals on non-alcoholic drug addicts, with NA's address and phone number. These were read and discussed; 1. In re Traditions, we stressed not naming a group after a treatment center, as we are not affiliated - many times, meetings turn into groups; 2. Stressed having a committee to meet and share once a month, the clearance procedures. Also stressed screening; 3. How to get to a meeting publicized by a.-fliers; b.-announcing; c.-word of mouth.

One member has an AA meeting in a non-alcoholic treatment facility, and the meeting is slow in getting started. It was suggested - "have patience". Question was asked - what is an open-restricted meeting and why the staff feels that the client has a need for this. Answer is - It is restricted for people from outside, but open for clients. Some facilities require 3-6 mos. before clients may return. Concerning Psychiatric Hospitals, we need to let AA members know what to expect when going inside facility.

Suggestion made that a chart be drawn for your area, outlining facility meetings, how to attend them, and who to contact before attending. In getting volunteers ask people you can count on. Some members are more comfortable in the meetings they started in at the facility.

Some Guidelines for screening people were discussed - suggestion made to have people talk to their sponsors before going to the meetings.

Beverly stated that she has asked for information on meetings in facilities, through Intergroups, and Districts - that she would be glad to come to the N. Fl. Meeting opened in usual manner, with the Serenity Prayer. Introduction of Tom Lepinski, who spoke about Traditions 1 and 2. He stated that Traditions cements groups together. They are for everyone. Traditions were started in 1950, and were formed in 1946, and through the trial and error method found what would work and what would not work. Tradition One - Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on AA unity. Tradition Two - For our group purpose

GSR MEETING, Cont'd: there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern. No one likes a "power hungry drunk". We should use first and last names in closed AA meetings. No one speaks for AA - it is the word of God speaking through people. We must identify with the recovery of alcoholism. Without group officers, there would be chaos- the group has the authority, through God, to elect a Secretary, Treasurer, GSR, DCM, Delegate- this keeps the line of communication open. Tradition 3 deals with a desire to stop drinking ONLY - no other addictions.

Marty C. referred to a problem of personality conflicts in a large group- there is a large resentment against one member - other members are leaving group: The 24 Hour book can cover this problem. The person should be confronted with love. From "As Bill Sees It" - What would the Master do? (P 43)..

Nadine spoke of an ego problem for an individual who says all meetings are open. Address the issue of being a member of one group, only. This is the suggested AA way. It is possible to hold an office in more than one group - if the offices are different. This is a debatable issue. Ralph S. referred to a club banning a person from coming to meetings or to the club. Can this be done? Answer - AA allows personal freedom of expression. Acceptance is necessary for the newcomer. Clubs should not interfere with the meetings - the meeting should move in this case. Club and Group are two separate entities. The Club has the right to enforce its own rules in re club matters.- they don't have to follow the Traditions - But AA Groups do have to follow Traditions.

There was discussion on following: 1.-Women bringing children to meeting-if some object, group can work this out through group conscience; 2.-changing term "Group" to "Gathering" in the case of specialized groups, i.e. Women's, Men's, Gays, etc.; 3.-One group started a Literature Discussion Group, where they study the pamphlets.; 4.-Definition for GSR (General Service Representative) would read in a name change as Gathering Service Representative!

Meeting closed, with basket passed, and closing with Lord's Prayer.
