FIRST QUARTERLY MINUTES OF NORTH FLORIDA AREA CONFERENCE OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

January 15-16-17-, 1988 - Crystal River, FL.

OFFICERS' & DCMS' MTG., Sat., 1/16/88, 4:00 P.M.: Chmn., Tom D , opened with a moment of meditation, followed by the Serenity Prayer. Secty., Pat N , called the roll-Absent-DCMS #2, #4, #8. Minutes of last meeting approved as mailed. Treasurer's Report approved as read. Balance on hand, 12/31/87 - \$4,243.73; Prudent Reserve, 12/31/87 - \$10,010.94. Elise noted that our name now reads: "N.FL. Area Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous" - as it appears on our Charter and also our tax exempt certificate.

NEW BUSINESS: 1. Re District 14 petition for split, forming a new district #27 - Motion made and seconded that petition be presented to General Assembly for approval, pending receipt of map showing boundary lines. DCM14 advised the split would be comprised of 1 county and 3 cities, and the remainder of present 14 would then become new district #27.

2. The recommendation for changing Assembly format and beginning time was approved to be presented to the General Assembly.

3 Chmn., Tom D , advised that D.C. S is appointed to head a committee to work up a format outlining elected officer positions and appointed committee chairmen positions and duties relevant to both. Motion made and seconded that monies be allotted to cover expense of flyers re format to be ready for distribution by July.

4. Chairman asked for bids at this time for site location of the January, 1989 first quarterly meeting. Districts 12 and 23 made bid for meeting to be held in Melbourne, FL., January 13-14-15, 1989 at the Rialto Hilton (location-next to airport) room rates \$50.00 per night. Bid to be announced at General Assembly. This was the only bid made to date.

Tom thanked alternate chairmen for becoming more active in chairing meetings. He also felt that we have gotten off to a good start this year by including the early morning breakfast and the Concepts Workshop, together with the DCMWorkshop on the quarterly Agenda.

Floyd Zimmerman, DCM6 announced the second quarterly meeting will be held in St. Augustine, FL., April 8-9-10, 1988, at the Ponce DeLeon Convention Center, and they are planning to have a "Blue Ribbon" panel for the Concepts Workshop.

Meeting adjourned, 5:00 P.M., with basket passed and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

OPEN SPEAKER MTG., 1/16/88, 8:30 P.M.: Fred M opened the meeting and introduced as speaker, John "Murph the Surf" M , who shared his experiences, strengths and hopes with us.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY, Sunday, 1/17/88, 9:45 A.M.: Chmn., Tom D , opened the meeting with a moment of meditation, followed by the Serenity Prayer. He made the sad announcement that one of our loyal and dedicated members died early Sunday morning - Fern C , GSR, of Jacksonville. Fern gave unstintingly of her time and efforts to working with the Correctional Facilities Committee in actively participating in prison AA meetings and activities. She will be missed by all of us.

Roll Call taken- absent DCMS 2,4,8, 16. Minutes approved as mailed. Treasurer's Report approved as reported (see 12/31/87 balances in above meeting report). Elise called attention to corrections to make on report- i.e. Dist.4 Riverside Grp. 3 contrs., \$40.00; Riverview Study Grp. 1 contr., \$15.00. Total contributions figure remains unchanged; total number groups to read 104 (not 103); Under Dist. 3, correct group name to Westside (not Westlake); under Dist. 26 correct group name to Living Sober (not Kiving Sober). We were again advised by Elise that our name now is to read: "North Florida Area Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous". Basket passed at this time..

GEN'L. ASSEMBLY, cont'd: DELEGATE'S REPORT: Delegate, Dick [redacted] gave an informative report - Hi-Lites are as follows: 1. Joe [redacted] n, Southeast Regional Trustee, sends his love, and is looking forward to being with us at the January, 1989 meeting; 2; Dick has reported on the 1987 General Service Conference to 18 Districts - he hopes to visit total of all districts this year; 3. The 7th Tradition Challenge shows a 41.5% increase - however, N.Fl. went down and needs to increase efforts in contributions; 4. Reduction in cost of literature will continue. 5. The Daily Reflections project is underway - input from information returns has been slow; 6. Dick has press releases available, copies of that which we give to the media on Anonymity; 7. New and revised literature is on its way - a. Too Young and The AA member in English; also in Spanish - "AA for the Woman" out by 1/88, and "Do You Think You Are Different" out by end of 2/88.; Spanish Big Book Printing delayed to 1/89, due to lack of story material. Dick wants Feedback by April N Fl. Quarterly in re have you any problems with the AA Directory - i.e. use by other groups outside, or otherwise - Anonymity breaks, etc.; 8. Trustee Literature Committee is working several pieces i.e. AA History Book; revision on AA Armed Services; Service structure, which is to be included in the Service Pamphlet; a service piece to be developed on Service Sponsorship (Dick suggests "get a service sponsor"); 9. John Bragg, present Gen'l. Mgr. in New York, took a recent trip to Soviet Union - Dick has copy of his report dealing with many subjects on substance abuse, and that AA is very new there and not understood; 10. Dick has order forms for 16mm film cassettes; 11. Re Trustees, and why do we need them? They in effect make up the General Service Board of AA., serving a 4 yr. term - in effect, is the chief service arm of the Gen'l. Service Conf. - the AA members and the Groups, through their delegates, for AA policies, work with the delegates and for the fellowship; 12. GSO Archivist, Frank Mauser, states that our Archives are our history of suffering, writings, etc., as part of our legacy; 13. Preliminary Agenda for the 38th Annual General Service Conference, April 1988, has been released. The Theme this year is "Our Singleness of Purpose-Key to Unity" 14. Dick wants feedback from DCMs by April Quarterly on the following topics, which will be covered by the Central Theme Workshop at the Gen'l.Serv.Conf. - A. Re Tradition 3 - does one have to say they are an alcoholic at a closed AA meeting-Since Trad.3 states "-only requirement is desire to stop drinking"; B. Discuss how groups in your area handle the problems of AA members speaking at length about 1.-Other substances; 2..Other self-help fellowships; C. What steps are taken in your AA community to clarify what AA is and is not; and how AA cooperates but does not affiliate with court programs, treatment centers, employee assistance programs; D. How do we clearly state our singleness of purpose without creating division within the fellowship; E. What has sponsorship and a home group have to do with Unity and participation; F. What is done in your area to better inform AA groups and members about our "Singleness of Purpose". Dick concluded his report by thanking the Assembly for its faith and trust in their delegate.

ASSEMBLY BUSINESS, re Tom [redacted], Chmn.: 1. There is one bid to date for the Jan., 1989 1st qtly. N.Fl. Assembly site, made by Districts 12 & 23 - at the Rialto Hilton (next to airport), Melbourne, Fl. - with similar room rates of \$50.00 per nite dates tentative for Jan. 13-14-15, 1989, with first class meeting rooms Motion made and seconded this bid be accepted.- affirmative. 2. Re starting time of Sunday Assembly to be 9:00 A.M. Agenda changes have been implemented in this assembly (1/17/87) re inclusion on the Agenda of Early Sat. morning breakfast mtg, Concepts Workshop, and the DCM Workshop. No motion needed - approval was unanimous. 3. Motion made and seconded that District 14 be split, pending receipt of map boundary changes, to become Districts 14 and 27. Affirmative vote by Assembly. 4. Announcement made that all the new 1988 Service Manuals, displayed by Grapevine Comm. had been sold at this conference. REMINDER: All literature displayed must be paid for at time of purchase. 5. Tom [redacted], Alt. Chmn., advised that Sat. nite Speaker Mtg., beginning with this Assembly, will be taped; announcement re 32nd Annual Florida State Convention - Theme "Share the Sparkle", will be in Jacksonville, July 20,21,22,23,24, 1988. Detailed flyers from Convention Comm. will go out by Feb. 1, 1988; A committee report to be presented possibly by July quarterly Assembly re feasibility of having 2 central cities in North Florida as sites for future quarterly meetings; Chmn., Tom [redacted], noted that 3 committee meetings were chaired by the Alt. Chmn. - he thanked alternate chairmen for active participation, and also thanked Tom L [redacted] and Bob S [redacted], past delegates for their contributions to this Assembly, and also thanked the Host Group, Dist.13, for smooth functioning meetings.

GEN'L. ASSEMBLY, cont'd: 6. Alt. Chmn., Tom D [redacted], called for Committee Reports - see attached pages.

7. The 2nd quarterly meeting will be held in St. Augustine, April 8-9-10, 1988 at the Pance De Leon Convention Center. Special Note: Ruth J [redacted], Pacific Regional Trustee, will be attending, and will be the Saturday night Speaker.

Meeting adjourned 11:35 A.M., closing with the Lord's Prayer.

CONCEPTS WORKSHOP Tom L [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 8:45 A.M.

Meeting opened in usual manner. Attendance - Approx. 90 The following are Hi-Lites given by Tom: The Twelve Concepts for World Service were approved in 1962. Bill Wilson realized we needed Concepts - is most important part of AA for groups and individual alcoholics. Gift of sobriety relates to spiritual growth; Accept people as they are - not as you wish them to be; A spiritual life is lived, not memorized; Steps 3, 5, 9, and 11 are the spiritual concepts - the other steps are spiritual overtones in our learning how to live; Service work will become dull and boring if one is not fully committed to "this way of life"; In service we must build on trust - i.e. not what you or I want, but trust in this program of AA; Take everything AA has to offer, and pass it on - all this is preparation for you in your progress in sobriety; Tom closed these hi-lites by stating that his life is fuller and enriched through commitment to service work.

Meeting closed with Lord's Prayer.

DISTRICT COMMITTEE MEMBERS' WORKSHOP Tom D [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 9:45 A.M.

Attendance - 45. Meeting opened in usual manner. Topic opener -- Future Assemblies - re changes of meeting time, and addition of meetings to the Agenda. Complaints were voiced about Committee Reports taking up too much ^{time} suggestion made to either limit time of each report, or omit reading of same at the Assembly, since all are included in written Minutes mailed to each member. Suggestion also made that DCMs might make the mailed minutes available to groups through the District meetings Also suggested, limit time of each report at Assembly to 2 or 3 minutes, as is suggested in the Service Manual; also, have business portion of Assembly first, followed by reports; also replace the early "Sharing Session" with additional time added to Assembly. Dick Pickens suggested 9:00 A.M. be starting time, with Delegate's Report given first (the delegate knows material from G30 that no one else at Assembly is familiar with), followed by the Business, old and new, and then reports given. It was also noted that the entire week-end of meetings is a sharing session. Motion made and seconded that Assembly begin at 9:00 A.M., roll call taken, minutes of last meeting approved, Treasurer's report given and approved, with basket passed next, followed by the Delegate's Report, then Business portion, followed by shortened committee reports, closing meeting with announcements, and the Lord's Prayer., said motion, which was carried unanimously, to be presented to the Officers/DCMS afternoon meeting, for approval to present to Assembly for its approval.

Tom C. questioned time of major committee reports being limited- Chmn., Tom D., responded that the new DCM Workshop would allow time for in depth input on topics that time did not allow for at the Officer/DCM meeting due to growth of N.Fl. Area, and AA required information disbursement. It was also emphasized again that all group change information is to be channeled through Pat N 1, Corresponding Secty.

Literature sales were discussed, and suggestion made that sale of AA literature versus Hazeldon, Al-Anon, and other should be kept separate - i.e. AA funds are to be used for purchase of AA Conference Approved Literature from G30, only.. Group Conscience decision or G30 suggestion that AA approved literature be given priority. Reminder to Intergroups - State Sales Tax must be paid when purchasing literature from Intergroups or Central Offices.

Meeting adjourned with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

GEN'L. SERVICE REPRESENTATIVES' MTG. Danny T., Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 4:00 P.M.

Attendance - 100. Meeting opened in usual manner. A film strip on "Circles of Love And Service" was presented and was well received. There was a number of new GSRs in attendance for their first assembly, now becoming involved in service work in their areas. Topics discussed are as follows: 1. Where does money go which is received from various AA functions? - Dist. 13 Intergroup Rep., Dick H., stated they send monies received from gratitude dinners to GSO. It was also pointed out that monies raised by other types of functions within an area can go to the area District or to its Intergroup; 2. Question raised in re reading of the 24 Hour Book at a meeting (this is not a General Service approved piece) - It is suggested by GSO that it not be read, but it is not mandatory. Conclusion of group was - Let the group conscience be the guide.;- and also mentioned was "whatever works-don't fix it" - i.e. if reading this book helps the individual to stay sober, go for it. Also, if it is read before the preamble, it is not a part of the meeting, itself. One reason was given as explanation of why some areas do not sell the book with AA literature is that it violates the 7th tradition of being self-supporting, and that the monies used to make the book available would not be going to GSO. It was also pointed out that the problem will take care of itself when GSO publishes a meditation book (Daily Reflections will be forthcoming in near future), as voted for approval by the members; 3. Final discussion was on open meetings, and should people attending open discussion meetings, who are not alcoholics, be allowed to speak - i.e. such as Al-Anons or friends of the alcoholic? Bottom line, after much discussion, was - if they were affected by the disease of alcoholism they have a right to be there and to speak.

Meeting closed with basket passed, and the Lord's Prayer.

ARCHIVES COMMITTEE MTG. Suzanne H , Alt. Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 2:45 P.M.

Attendance - 24. Meeting opened in usual manner. Members were seated around tables, eight to each table, in workshop fashion. Lists of question that remain to be decided about Archives Collection were distributed to each participant. The breakdown of the N.Fl. Area into geographical zones was outlined, and illustrated with a map display. It was determined that five of the six zones were represented at the meeting, giving us a good base with which to begin Archival collection throughout the Area. At that time, the meeting was turned over to a general discussion. Each table appointed a leader and a note-taker, and exchanged thoughts about the issues raised on the questionnaires. After about 30 minutes of lively discussion, a spokesman from each table reported on ideas or opinions which emerged out of their session. A few of the good ideas included: 1. Establishing a flow of Archival information from a co-ordinator in each zone thru DCMs to GSRs, then to the groups; 2. Approaching other Areas for advice; 3. Finding experienced people who have moved to Florida; 4. Putting a message in Intergroup bulletins requesting historical material; 5. Researching Black history influence of A.A.; 6. Copying documents to microfilms.

MEETING adjourned 3:45 P.M., with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

CPC (COOP/PROF.COMMUNITY) Joe S chaired for Bobbe L , Chmn. Sat., Jan. 16, 88 2:45 P.M.

Attendance - 85. Collection - \$39.72. Meeting opened in usual manner. Joe stated that Seminole County (District 18) was very active in school areas. Volusia County (Dists. 8/20/21) is getting active. Citrus County (Dist. 13) very active (they are also mentioned in this month's CPC Report.) Districts 18 & 19 are having Workshops. Districts 12 & 23 have been giving presentations at least once a month for the past three months. CPC WORK IN NORTH FLORIDA IS GOING GREAT! District 13 is going to maintain the Golden Alkie Award. The theme for today's program was "EAP-Employee Assistance Program". Heidi who works in that field in Brevard County gave an in-depth rundown on what EAP is all about.- citing three anonymous examples of her cases; Also she mentioned various ways on how AA could cooperate (not affiliate) with the EAP programs in each Area of N.Fl.; She also said she could use meeting lists from the various districts. Pat G., of District 13, spoke about their last presentation in Crystal River Middle School at PTA meeting. Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

GRAPEVINE MTG. Dick C , Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 1:30 P.M.

Attendance - 45. Meeting opened in usual manner. Facts about the Grapevine: It is AA's Meeting in Print; It is approved literature - it is permissible to display Grapevine material with GSO literature, but other material (Not conference approved) should be displayed separately. Dick, Literature Chmn., Hernando County, as a result of a local survey, is now ordering early

Grapevines and GSO material. Grapevine Representatives must order his own Workbook from New York. Order forms are available. Brian, District 12, asked "What does a GVR do?"-how do you get the people together? The Packet, available from the Grapevine, explains what is entailed. Points noted: Order forms for subscriptions and tapes were reviewed; The December, 1987 issue indexes all articles of the preceding year; Also, included in all issues are "Closed Meeting" Topics, and also a Calendar of Events; Use Grapevine articles as the focal point for a meeting- and if you want controversy, you can find it in the Grapevine. Many groups have had good response to Traditions, as meeting topics.; Question asked - can Grapevine articles be reprinted for use by Intergroup Newsletters? Yes - but give credit to source. Prior approval is needed for outside newspapers; The Grapevine offers four ways to sign author's name to protect anonymity; Send to New York for circulars re writing an article; D.C. Stultz presented Dick Cale, Chmn., with a T-Shirt, inscribed "Heard It On The Grapevine".; Bulk shipments at \$4.00 per 50 back issues are available; If a District cannot bear the full cost of distributing subscriptions to institutions, will New York pay? Answer - No; What is the official name to Grapevine- Answer - "Box 1980"- so as not to confuse with a magazine published by the F.B.I. Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer. NOTE: SALE OF GRAPEVINE LITERATURE AND SERVICE MANUALS AT THIS ASSEMBLY TOTALED \$415.50.

TREATMENT FACILITIES MTG. Martha C. , Alt. Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 1:30 P.M.

Meeting opened in usual manner. Attendance - 76. Beverly F. , Chmn., was unable to be present this quarterly meeting, but will be with us in April - she sends warmest regards. Newcomers at this meeting were introduced and welcomed to the world of service work. Topic for discussion was "How do you get people from the groups interested in doing treatment facility work?". The chair shared a few tips on how to present a service workshop in your district to help inform AA members and the treatment facilities' personnel; Districts 12 & 15 had a joint workshop last year that was quite successful; Other suggestions given as follows: 1. Temporary sponsorship programs; 2. Attending meetings at treatment centers; 3. Ask your sponsor how to get involved. Chances are - if you don't have a sponsor - you are probably not ready for service work!; 4. It was suggested that your home group elect a treatment facility representative to get involved with the district, and report back to the group. We talked about treatment reps. working closely with CPC representatives. These two areas of service compliment each other and will result in successful structure and coordination. We shared about being called by a treatment center counselor and being asked to come in to listen to a 5th Step from one of the center's clients. This kicked off a very healthy discussion at this meeting today of the pros and cons on both sides - some thought we were breaking Traditions by going in and becoming involved with an outside enterprise; others thought it was strictly AA business to do 5th Steps, until it was pointed out that the Big Book does not say that a 5th Step is done with an AA member - there are other suggestions in the book relative to this. Some thought it was a good idea only if the AA member asked directly and not the counselor - others felt they would go anywhere the hand of AA reached out. What are your feelings on this? Discuss it with your group rep. and let us know at the next assembly! A suggestion was made that each district list their treatment facilities, the facilities' contact persons, do the facilities have AA program yet, do they have temporary sponsorship - and send such a list to Beverly F. , Chmn., at Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

PUBLIC INFORMATION MTG. D.C. S. , Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 11:00 A.M.

Attendance - 75.. Meeting opened in usual manner. Chmn. recapped PI purpose. The last PI goal published in the NFA Newsletter was for the districts to purchase and show the new videocassette, "AA and Young People." D.C. thanked the local Intergroup of District 13 for providing the literature display for the Conference. Alternate Chmn., George C. , played "Mr. Alcohol" in a skit showing how "Jimmy" got caught up on alcohol. The rumors that the PI chairman got drunk and passed out on the floor during the PI workshop are true - D.C. played the part of Jimmy in the skit. The intent of the skit was to show how the message could be carried to school children. Following the skit, several topics were discussed and experiences shared on intervention and anonymity. Tips on how-to and how-not-to publicize your upcoming talk to a service organization were given. Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

DISABILITIES MTG. Tom C. [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 11:00 A.M.
 Meeting opened in usual manner. Tom requested a name change - as he said, the name "disability" means anything that interferes with recovery - we are all disabled. So, he said, let's have a new name. Specifically, for us, disability means anything that interferes with someone getting to an AA meeting - wheelchair, sight, hearing, etc. In making a meeting better for one it also makes it better for all. Tom further said that he attends three meetings at once - one on the way to a meeting, one at the meeting, and one on the way home. SHARING is the essence of AA. All of us in AA are indeed "Special People". Do not hesitate to ask for outside help to facilitate members with impairments to attend a meeting. In the Guidelines there is a chapter on Disability, and GSO state that we can use profession help - either for a fee or at no charge. Some churches have people available to assist in all of the disabled areas. Tom reminded us that the 12 Steps is available in sign language, the Big Book is available in both Braille and on Tape, and also in several different languages. Following a spirited discussion on a name change, the group conscience voted to name the meeting "Accessability", - which indicates we are headed in a positive direction!

CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES MTG. Bob S. [redacted], Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 11:00 A.M.

Attendance - approx. 60. Collection-\$32.00. Meeting opened in usual manner. Roll call taken showed 13 Institutional/Corr.Facils. Representatives covering 18 Districts were present. All those who are doing correctional work should be certain to have the pamphlet to distribute to inmates, titled "Memo to an Inmate Who May Be an Alcoholic". The Palatka area wants to get an AA program started there. Most of discussion at this meeting, today, centered on topic of inmates attending AA meetings, and saying they are not alcoholics. Although they cannot be stopped from attending meetings (gain time for attending meetings is an important factor in correctional facilities), it was pointed out that only AA members (i.e.-alcoholics) can hold office in their group. Also noted - even though inmate denies being an alcoholic, the majority of them are there because of alcohol related crimes. Cooperation of a good facility superintendent and Inside Sponsors working with Outside Sponsors makes for a good AA program. Temporary Sponsorship programs are of importance in correctional facility when an inmate is released. Videocassettes, which were approved in September, '87 by GSO, according to Dick Pickens, were to be sent to all correctional facilities on a complimentary basis. Bob will check further on this re North Florida area. Dist. 19 rep. stated they have rec'd one. District 26 wants to get things going in their area, and needs names and phone numbers to help start carrying the message to correctional facilities.
 Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

INTERGROUP MTG. Dick H., Acting Secty. Sat., 1/16/88 9:45 A.M.

Attendance - full room, standing room only. Meeting opened in usual manner, with Geo. C. [redacted], as chairman. George gave report on the current status of Hernando Cty. Intergroup and some of the goals that have been reestablished within the Intergroup - specifically, the Hotline and the Correctional Facilities program. There was lively discussion on several topics: 1. In re use of answering services as opposed to member-manned Hotlines; 2. Turmoil experienced due to high turnover rate of group representatives - it was felt that groups and/or individual members were not living by the Traditions and Concepts; 3. Conflict re selling non-conference approved literature through the Intergroup. The general feeling was conflicts will cease when we get back to operating within framework of Steps, Traditions, and Concepts.
 Meeting adjourned, with basket passed, and closing with the Lord's Prayer.

SECRETARY/TREASURER MTG. Bill G., Chmn. Sat., 1/16/88 9:45 A.M.

Attendance - approx. 25. Meeting opened in usual manner. Main topic dealt with question, "How do we get people to consider holding a group or district office at election time?" Following suggestions were submitted: 1. Announce a special group business meeting, or a DCM-GSR meeting for nominations - people who are interested will attend; 2. Volunteer people whom you feel would be qualified to serve, but who are hesitant to come forward on their own - it might let them know they are needed; 3. Members already in service work should let those they are sponsoring know the importance and the benefits of service work; 4. Form a nominating committee; 5. Keep a positive attitude-let members know they are welcome to be part of service; 6. Keep it attractive rather than promoting it; 7. Talk it up at your group mtg. at announcement time.



It has been the custom for many years to send an annual letter formally requesting contributions from the groups within our Area for the support of the General Assemblies of the Area, with especial attention to sending a Delegate from this Area to the General Service Conference held in New York each spring.

In the early years almost the only real expense the Assembly had was that of the Delegate. However, with the developing of the structure within the Areas paralleling very much that of the overall General Service Office activities, our expenses have increased proportionately.

The General Service Office has issued two pamphlets with suggested distribution of funds of the groups (after the group expenses have been taken care of)...the 60, 30, 10 plan, which suggested 60% to local Intergroups or Central Offices; 30% to GSO in New York; and 10% to the Area Committee. The second pamphlet on this subject is Supporting the A.A. Support System. This pamphlet reiterates the 60-30-10 plan with the addition of suggested division of funds in the areas now having districts that are active in services and have expenses of their own.

This particular annual letter is a reminder to each of you that we are the 10% Although this current letter is written in March, it used to be that it was sent out around the first of February to remind the groups we had to send our first installment for support of the Delegate to New York to cover Conference expenses. As your treasurer, I would like to congratulate North Florida for continuing and prompt support of the Committee and Assembly. Contributions for the first quarter have been coming in steadily and plentifully....THANK YOU. Your treasure also would like to reiterate that she feels that it is the act of contributing by the groups that is most important...the amount is not the essential factor. If EVERY group made a donation...the idea boggles the mind!!

NOW, MAY I ASK A SPECIAL FAVOR FROM EACH AND EVERY ONE OF YOU..... First of all, your Treasurer is NOT a Seer, not clairvoyant...in fact my crystal ball is decidedly murky!!
